There have been many complaints raised against a practice which has been indulged in by some saloon keepers and others on East Temple Street, that of casting the dirt sweepings of their premises into the water sewer, thus fouling the water which numbers of people living in the southern portion of town have to use for drinking and culinary purposes. A person guilty of such a filthy practice cannot have much reliance on his word, and every case discovered should be treated rigorously.

We remind people who have heretofore infringed the ordinance for the regulation of the above matters with impunity that they will not be permitted to do so in future, and all such should take due notice that prompt action will be taken by the city officers in the enforcement of the regulations.
