THEY RELATE TO COERCION.

Refused to Take Them Up Before as He Did Not Want to Interfere In Election.

New York, Dec. 26 .- Dist. - Atty. Jerome has written a letter to D. Cady Herrick of counsel for the Mutual Life Policyholders' association, saying he is now willing to take up the matter concerning charges against President Peabody of the Mutual Life Insurance company of coercion in connection with the election of trustees of that company.

These charges were brought to the attention of the district attorney some time ago by Mr. Herrick. Mr. Jerome refused to act ou them at the time, on the ground that he did not want his office "used to influence the election of

office "used to influence the ectober of trustees in the Mutual Life." - The district attorney's letter was re-ferred by Judge Herrick to John De-witt Warner, chief counsel for the Pollwitt warner, chief counsel, who in turn handed it over to Russell W. Fish, sec-ptary of the association. Mr. Fish, h a communication to Mr. Warner, jets forth the attitude of the association regarding Mr. Jerome's determina-tion to take up the matter now. In it

r. Fish said: "As to the attitude of this association in bringing the charges against Mr. Peabody, I understand your purpose was to prevent the continuing of the crime of coercion of employes in be-half of the administration ticket, rather half of the administration treat, many than to bring about the punishment of a completed crime after the criminal had profited to the fullest extent. "While the punishment of the crime is important and the association trusts that the district attorney will take up the matter vigorously, nevertheless, in

the matter vigorously, nevertheless, in view of the fact that the election is over and—by Mr. Jeroine's acquescence -Mr. Peabody and his fellow lawbreak-ers have already reaped the fruits of the illegal actions, so that our interest is only that of all citizens, we feel that any eriminal action to be taken at this time is the concern of the district alany criminal action to be taken at this time is the concern of the district at-torney as such, rather than ours. The speaker pointed out that the Boers, whom the Indians helped to subjugate, had been given self-government, while In-dia was still without it, and urged the raising of a large patricule fund to edu-cate the Indians as to their rights and for the carrying on of the campaign in England. BIDS FOR OKLAHOMA LANDS.

Washington, Dec. 26 .- Officials in the general land office are preparing to tabulate the bids which have been received for the sale of about 565,000 acres of pasture and wood reserve lands in Klowa and Commanche counles, Oklahoma, Between the 3rd and 15th of, this

nonth the officials of the land office eccived 7,621 individual bids and it is estimated that each bidder has bid on an average of 30 tracts, some of the bidders, it is understood, having bid on every one of the tracts, 2,531, in number. This will necessitate the making and indexing of nearly 250,000 cards, and it is expected to tabulate this tremendous list, which take quite all of three months, before the highest bldder on all the tracts can be determined.

All of the defendants in the suit join in the motion except the Waters-Pierce

Oil company, which is a resident of the eastern division of the Eastern judicial district of Missouri, Henry S. Priegi filed the motion, as counsel for all the parties. Accompanying it was the affi-davit of Charles T. White, assistant secretary of the Standard, who certifies that all the petitioners are non-resi-dants of this standard. that all the petitioners are non-resi-dents of this district.

RECEIVERS FOR RAILROADS,

Mobile, Ala., Dec. 26.-Upon applica-tion of Ambrose Monell, Thomas Morri-son and John McLeod, alleging the in-solvency of the railroad, the chancery court this afternoon appointed F. E. Dewey and J. Jewis Dantzler receivers of the Mobile, Jackson & Kansas City railroad, running from Mobile to Mid-dleton, Tenn., 360 miles. Dewey was formerly general manager of the rail-road and was ousted about 18 months ago, being succeeded by T. F. Whittlesey of Toledo. O., the present general manager.
