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TO THOSE WHO NEED FOOD.

This is a season of plenty as far as the wheat crop in this part of the country is concerned, and it is estimated that not less than three million bushels will be harvested. The grain will be a low price, but that will make no difference in the man who is without money. If an ounce of wheat were the price, the man without the dollar, so far as purchase is concerned, would be as bad off as if it were ten times that figure. And in connection with the heavy wheat crop there are two other conditions now being the people here. First—There are a good many families without the dollar, and the prospect of getting it through loss of employment they have not been able to earn that which will be needed to supply the necessities of life. Second—There will be a vast quantity of wheat, which would provide many people with bread, wasted unless something is done at once to gather the grain; the only available means of preventing this great loss is by glazing the grain.

There is no need of arguing that this waste should be prevented in the interest of those who are in need of winter supplies. That will be readily conceded. Now, what is to be done? First, those who are themselves in need of employment and assistance. They can prevent the waste of glazing the grain, and there is no doubt, but all parties who properly conduct themselves will be warmly welcomed by the farmers in performing this labor. The matter has been agitated throughout the country, and the way prepared for the glazers. When and how shall the glazing be done? The time is now, for delay till autumn comes is waste of time. It is not justifiable. However, it is estimated, a party of men and boys, nine, prepared to stand out for a few nights, and get the permission, which will be readily given in gathering the wheat left by the harvesters. They will be able not only to gain fair returns in the grain collected, and get the benefit of a pleasant summer's outing, but the probability is strong that they will receive material assistance in the way of farm products, such as milk, fruit, etc., during their stay, and perhaps employment for a time. At any rate they can get plenty to feed themselves during the coming winter, and if they obtain the wheat there will be a way provided whereby it may be converted into food.

As the weather grows colder, the people who are unwilling to take every precaution to see what they can do to prevent the waste of wheat, will find themselves in a very bad way. It is not too late to take action in this city, both out of work for some time past, and their families reverting aid. When the wheat glazing proposition was made to them, they fully and justly rejected it, saying that if they could not get work at their trade, they would not work. Such individuals as these are not likely to receive very liberal assistance while there are weather persons in the line.

Those who may be disappointed in this business could not have any idea that it is to be the dignity of any person in this community, when circumstances require it, to earn his food by glazing it in the field. The proposition is a reasonable one, and has been followed by a number of the best people here. There is a strong feeling of sympathy in a neighboring county which annually makes a considerable sum by glazing the wheat fields.
