

WORLD REMOVE WRECK OF MAINE

Gov. Magoon Recommends it.
Sunken Battleship Being Serious
Menace to Shipping.

OBSTRUCTION HAS GROWN.

Leaving of Warship Where it is Has
Become a National Repeach and
An International Scandal.

Washington, Jan. 24.—Gov. Magoon of the provincial government of Cuba in his annual report to the secretary of war, made public today, brings to general attention the wreck of the United States battleship Maine in Havana harbor, and recommends that the government take immediate steps to accomplish its removal without further delay. He says:

"The wreck of the Maine continues to lie in the mud and waters of Havana harbor. The sunken battleship is a serious menace to the shipping of the harbor, as it occupies a portion of the best anchorage. The obstruction has increased annually during the past 10 years by causing a shoal. The most serious danger to the harbor is the fact that the entire harbor is gradually filling up and this shoal seriously interferes with the action of the tides, and therefore the entire harbor is gradually filling. It will be necessary in a short time to begin dredging in order to provide proper anchorage for the large amount of shipping now entering the harbor unless the wreck is removed. The anchorage is also restricted by the wreck and the shoal, for ships are obliged to anchor at sufficient distance to prevent grounding in case they strain on their cables."

Even more important than this obstruction to navigation is the fact that this wreck, although it contains the bodies of 43 American seamen, or what is left of them, is apparently abandoned and forgotten by the government and people of the United States. Thousands of Americans and other thousands of other nationalities annually enter the harbor of Havana and probably not one soul is expressed regret and sorrow for the deplorable spectacle. It has become a national reproach and an international scandal. The neglect to remove the wreck is attributed by many, especially the large Spanish contingent in Cuba, to the fact that its removal will disclose the fallacy of the popular belief that the Maine was destroyed by a torpedo or mines laid by the coast waters and destroyed it; however, it should be added that the Cuban authorities were also restrained by a belief that the United States would some time desire and attempt to remove it and preserve the wreck as a whole instead of breaking it up and removing it in the more inexpensive manner."

The correspondence on file in the department of state and the navy department at Washington shows that a better provision in those departments that it is necessary to secure, by a treaty or otherwise, the consent of the republic of Cuba to the authorities of United States entering the harbor of Havana and proceeding with the work of removal. This permission, if necessary, can be easily secured and the Cuban government would gladly afford every assistance in its power to accomplish the desired result, not only because of the injury to the harbor facilities, but also because of the compelling of patriotism and sentiment. I earnestly recommend that the United States government take immediate steps to accomplish the removal without further delay."

Cummings of New York Drew a Distinction Between "Loan" and "Lend" Which McKinley Accepted.

Washington, Jan. 21.—The average member of the house who makes a carefully prepared speech and thinks that he has made something of a hit—and this impression is apt to be formed if he is given any applause—is quite likely, when he utters his last words, to stand in his place expectantly, as if he thought his legislative associates would crowd around him and shake his hand and tell him that he has made a wonderful speech. "Private John" Allen had not been in the house more than two years before he noticed this thing. One day as he was standing up to make a speech he was suddenly interrupted by a member of the opposite party who said to him: "And now, Mr. Speaker, I shall return immediately to the cloakroom, where I shall be glad to receive the congratulations of all the members on my speech." It is almost useless to add that in a few minutes the cloakroom was full of overdoing.

Representative Nick Longworth has introduced a resolution in the house authorizing the secretary of the loan—so the resolution is worded—certain tests to the festival encampment of the North American Gymnastic union to be held at Cincinnati in June. Years ago the late William McKinley asked unanimous consent in the house to pass a resolution to secure government exhibits for a local exposition at Cincinnati. James J. Cummings of New York said he would not object if the distinguished gentleman from Ohio would consent to change one word. The future president said he would if it did not destroy the effect of his resolution. Cummings replied that it would not and added: "I merely want the word 'loan' changed to 'lend.' That would put it into correct English. 'Lend' in our language applies only to money, 'lend' to articles such as are mentioned in my friend's resolution." Mr. McKinley saw the point and consented to the change, but he is pretty soon composed a measure and found that Cummings was correct. Cummings had been a printer and a proofreader before becoming a great newspaper writer and a successful congressman, and his early training came into play in the house.

SURE TO BE POPULAR.
Representative Burnett, the shortest man in the house, being just even five feet high, has introduced a measure giving rural mail carriers a holiday on the 25th of December of each year. His bill may not get through, but he will make himself pretty well known to a large number of people in the rural districts.

ANOTHER PATRIOTIC SOCIETY PROPOSED.

Senator Bulkeley of Connecticut is pressing a bill to incorporate the descendants of the signers of the Declaration of Independence. This order was organized at the Jamestown exposition held in 1897. The purpose is to find out just how many of the descendants there are and to bring them all together in a large patriotic society.

CURTILMENT OF SALARIES.

Francis B. Loomis of Ohio for the next five years is to receive only \$1,000 as compensation general to the exposition instead of the \$4,000 that he had commenced to draw. Other members of this commission will get nothing until the end of 1910. This is because the Japanese postponed the exposition from 1912 to 1917. As is well known, Loomis has had quite an experience in the consular and diplomatic service. He was appointed minister to Venezuela by President McKinley in 1897. This was a bridal present in effect, for Mrs. Loomis, for her late father was a great friend and staunch supporter of Mr. McKinley in all his political contests. Cal O'Laughlin, secretary to the commission, like Loomis, is a newspaper man. Loomis is not bothered as to where his bread and meat will come from, but O'Laughlin will have to fill in his time by hustling for the newspapers in the interim.

RESTORATION OF CONFISCATED MONEY.

During the Civil war when General Ben Butler had possession of the city of New Orleans he seized about \$225,000 of the funds of one of the national banks there, and as it was a good money being coin, he turned it into the United States treasury. It has been there ever since, but in a few days it will be restored to its owners. As Congress has passed and the president has signed a bill to that effect. All these years efforts have been made to collect the matter. The money has simply been lying idle in the treasury. Ex-Congressman Phil Thompson of Kentucky engineered the matter through Congress for the bank, and he gets a pretty snug fee for his trouble.

BUNZOATE OF SODA.

Dr. Ira Remsen Says it is Not Injurious to Health.
Washington, Jan. 25.—The benzoate of soda used as food preservative is not injurious to health in the judgment of which Dr. Ira Remsen, president of the Johns Hopkins university, is chairman. This conclusion, which has been approved by Rev. Wilson, chief of the bureau of chemistry.

BEDOQUINS RAID STATION. KILLING FORTY OFFICIALS

London, Jan. 25.—A dispatch to the Daily Telegraph from Chicago states that a report has been received from Bedonkohe in Arabia that Bedonkohe, the station of Ottoman and killed 40 officials. It is also reported that the Bedonkohe attacked another station but were repulsed after two hours fighting. According to a dispatch to the Times from Constantinople the raid occurred a couple of months ago.

DESETERT BERT DORT CLEVERLY CAUGHT

Denver, Jan. 25.—Bert Dort, an 18-year-old deserter from the Marine island navy yard at San Francisco, yesterday walked into the police station and was arrested. The officers have been looking

for Dort for some time and inserted a want ad in a local paper as a bait with which to attract him. Dort answered the advertisement and after having been engaged for a fictitious position was sent to the police station with a note which read as follows:

"The bearer is Bert Dort, you want him. Grab him now."

Ignorant of the contents of the note Dort presented it to the police captain on duty and was at once locked up.

MORE CHIB VICTIMS FOUND.

Chicago, Jan. 25.—Grapppling in the lake searchers today found three more bodies of workmen who perished in the

burning water with off South Chicago Wednesday. It is expected the victims will eventually number more than 50.

NEGRO LYNCHED.

Tusculum, Ala., Jan. 25.—Sam Day, a negro, was hanged by a mob

at Leighton, last night. He was charged with burning J. A. Galt's barn, containing 10 horses and mules.

FATAL HUNTING ACCIDENT.

Albuquerque, N. M., Jan. 25.—Charles Q. Goodman, 22 years of age, was accidentally shot and killed by Harry Ben-

jamin yesterday afternoon while the two were hunting quail along the Rio Grande. The men had started a bunch of quail, had killed several of them, and were following them up when Benjamin doubled back, fell with a cocked shotgun in his hand.
