## By Telegraph.

Florence, 8.

The term of the suspension of hostilities has been prolonged. Peace negotiations between Austria and Italy will take place at Prague. Count Barlioli and Gen. Marrolee will be the Italian Plenipotentiaries.

There was a severe storm on the Adriatic yesterday, by which several vessels of the Italian fleet were damaged. The Italian ram Affondatore was sunk in the port of Ancona; the crew were saved.

Houston, Texas, 10.

The State legislature convened on the 6th, and Gov. Throckmorton was inaugurated yesterday.

New Orleans, 10.

The deaths from cholera, from 6 a.m. yesterday to 6 p.m. today, number 24.

Cincinnati, 10.

Since last evening at 6 o'clock the books of the health officer show 40 deaths by cholera, only 9 being new cases, the others, although not reported, having been attacked one, two and three days previously. The health officer declares the disease to be on the decline. The whole number of deaths from all diseases, during the past 24 hours, is 75.

Philadelphia, 10.

Although the national convention will assemble Tuesday, it will probably adjourn over until the following day, after a short session, as the wigwam will not be entirely completed until then. When the wigwam is completed it will be the largest structure ever erected in the United States for political purposes. Seats have been provided for 150 Journalists, in front of the Speaker's stand.

The National Union State Central

Committee of this state have agreed upon a full list of delegates, including Edgar Cowan, W. F. Johnston, J. R. Hanigan and W. H. Tracy delegates at large. The delegates are already arriving, and it is believed that at least 3,000 will be present from all sections.

London, 13.

The armistice between Italy and Austria, has been renewed for four weeks. The official Berlin paper opposes the claim of France for an extension of frontier.

The Czar of Russia has visited the United States squadron at Cronstadt. Consols 87½; 5-20s 68½.

New York, 13.

The Savannah Herald of Friday reports 12 deaths by cholera on the Lawton place, Hilton Head Island, including 2 white men; the disease has entirely abated.

The City of Mexico advices, of the 20th ult., say that there is but little doubt that the Emperor Maximilian and his dependents will leave this Continent at an early day. The only hope of success is in the entreaties of the Emperor in Europe.

Washington, 13.

Col. Leavenworth, Indian Agent in the country of the Kiowas and Camanches, has just arrived here, and states that the Cheyennes from the north and those from the south, together with the Arapahoes and the Ogalalla bands of the Sioux are meeting in the Smoky Hill country, to hold their great meeting of the medicine lodge. The Cheyennes say that the whites shall not make roads through the Smoky Hill country, as it is their hunting ground. It is thought that much depends upon the result of the councils held at the medicine lodge, as to the attitude of these tribes towards the Government. If hostile influences should prevail, trouble may be anticipated from these Indians. The Kiowas and Camanches are quiet and peaceable, and are in a prosperous condition.

The Second Comptroller of the Treasury reports that the arrears of pay and bounty cannot be paid to disloyalists, nor can such arrears be passed over and payment made to the next person in the order of inheritance prescribed by the act of July 11th, 1862. In the case which called forth the above decision, he says the case is not similar to that of a non-resident of the United States, inasmuch as the act referred to provides for payment to the next heir resident, in the order prescribed; that no such provision is made in any law for passing over a disloyal heir, and that in such cases the money should be restored to the United States.

In compliance with the recent order of the War Department, re-arranging the commands of the different military departments, Gen. Canby has assumed command of the Department of Washington, vice Brvt. Maj-Gen. Augur.

Queen Emma, of the Sandwich Islands, arrived here this evening.

New York, 13.

A Philadelphia special says Mr. Vallandigham has been enrolled as a member of the convention, and there are indications of trouble being caused by his taking a seat. George Pollock, Superintendent of the United States mint, has been removed.

There were 378 deaths in Brooklyn last week, of which 113 were from cholera.

Philadelphia, 13.

The rain which has been falling today has interrupted the completion of the wigwam, and it will not be ready tomorrow. It is understood that a temporary organization will be had at the National guards Hall, 6th and Race streets. At a consultation of the chairmen of the state elections today with the executive committee, it was agreed that the organization of the convention should comprise two gentlemen from each delegation as vice Presidents, and the same number of each on the committees on resolutions, credentials, &c. Among the Chairmen selected by the various delegations are J. Tilden of New York, J. G. Abbott of Mississippi, T. S. Pomeroy of Maryland, J. S. Orr of South Carolina, Gov. Parsons of Alabama, P. A. Morse of Louisiana, Barton Abel of Missouri, W. S. Rosenberck of Ohio, O. H. Browning of Illinois, C. O. Loomis of Michigan and Gov. Porter

and Senator Cowan of Pennsylvania. Vallandigham positively declines to withdraw from the convention. Henry Clay Dean, of Iowa, has written a letter, declining to serve as a delegate.

It is generally believed that the business of the convention will be confined to an enunciation of principles, without reference to any political party now existing.

St. Petersburg, 12.

The United States naval officers made their official entry into this city yesterday, and had a grand reception. Fifty thousand people turned out to witness their entrance. They were welcomed by a magnificent oration, with music, cheers, display of flags, and thousands of handkerchiefs waving in all directions. The greatest enthusiasm prevailed.

The Hon. C. M. Clay, our Minister to the Court of St. Petersburg, gave a brilliant entertainment at his hotel to the diplomatic corps, the Heads of Departments and distinguished citizens, in honor of the naval officers.

A ball and supper were given by the Yacht Club, which was attended by the beauty and grace of the city.

All the public buildings were dressed in the Union colors and brilliantly illuminated, which, with the fireworks, tended to produce a very lively sensation. Altogether the affair was a splendid tribute to America.

Berlin, 12.

Prussia has informed Austria that she will maintain the right of Italy to Venetia. The semi-official organ, the Zeitung, says that Napoleon's absurd demand has raised hopes in France which it is impossible for Germany to fulfil. The ideas of the revolution must have taken the place of the usual course of policy of France. The changes which have taken place in Germany are of a national German and not of an international character, and convey no menace or danger to France.

Vienna, 11.

The Austrian Minister of finance has resigned.

The Austrian Ambassador to Rome has arrived in this city.

Brussels, Belgium, 12.

News received in this city from Vienna says that great excitement exists there; 482 men are to be tried on a charge of high treason. Crowds of people in the streets have hailed the Emperor Francis Joseph with shouts of "abdicate," "abdicate."

Florence, 12.

The four weeks armistice will continue in force after the expiration of that time, unless notice of its cessation is duly given by either power to the other. A line of demarcation between Austria and Italy has been agreed upon, and the Venetians, who have been compelled to emigrate from Venetia as a part of the Austrian Empire, can now return to Venetia.

A TWENTY-INCH gun, containing 140,000 pounds of metal, was lately cast at the Fort Pitt Foundry, in Pittsburg, Pa. It is designed for the "Puritan."

ACCOUNTS from all sections of South Carolina, represent the crop prospects for cotton and corn very gloomy. The injury has been occasioned by want of rain. The rice crop is in a flourishing condition.

THE recent hot weather has had the effect in Baltimore waters of killing thousands, if not millions, of small fish, alewives, etc., which are now floating in the various docks, emitting a stench almost intolerable.
