COUNCIL TO ACT FOR BOND ISSUE

Special Session Tonight Has That Matter Alone Up for Consideration.

"AMERICANS" IN A CORNER

Debts Pile Up and Treasury Runs Low So They See Big Loan Ahead as Their Only Means of Relief.

Once more, and, in the hope of the "American" municipal statesmen, for the last time, will the matter of the \$600,000 bond issue ordinance come before the city council tonight. And with nothing before the meeting but the matter of the bond issue, the council should certainly be able to take action for or against it

able to take action for or against this evening.

By manipulation consideration of the ordinance was deferred Monday night in the regular council meeting. Councilman Ferry, who is engineering the ordinance for the \$600,000 amount, asking first that the matter go over from the unfinished business head to come up under the heading of ordinances. Two stalwarts of the "inner circle," Davis and Stewart, were not present when the ordinance came up the second time, and Mr. came up the second time, and Mr. Ferry moved that the council take a recess until Thursday evening at 8 o'clock, at which time the ordinance should be taken up. After a brief consultation among the majority members, the recess was agreed to, and the matter west over the matter went over.

BLACK HEADS INSURGENTS.

Councilman Black, who heads the "insurgent" group, which is said to favor a bond issue, but in the reduced amount of \$400,000, did not oppose the postponement, and it was apparent that in the intervening time considerable "persuasion" was plan-ned by means of which the recalci-trant \$490,000 men were to be brought into line for the larger is-

The fact is, the city needs the money. What with the bank carrying overdrafts in the estimated sum of a quarter of a million dollars, and with interest payments constantly falling due, and with current expenses rilling up in a manner as to compel with interest payments constantly falling due, and with current expenses piling up in a manner as to compet the city to fall down on small improvement matters requiring only a few thousand dollars to carry out and consenting to its own citizens shouldering the load of the same for a year in order to secure the grading and guttering of a few blocks of street work, with a debt that reaches almost \$4,000,000 in bonded indebtedness, and with the unheard-of condition existing of an overdraft in the general fuild of more than \$11,000, all of which has been caused by the extravagance and recklessness of the "American" misadministration, the need for the bond issue is imperative, and it must go through! This is the excuse offered by the "Americans" headed by Mayor Bransford.

The purpose of issuing the bonds is given as the improvement and extension of the sewer and water systems of the city; in fact, it is only upon that kind of a representation that the bonds can be issued at all; they are sewer and water improvement bonds. True enough. That is the only resource of debt contracting ability which has not been grabbed up by the party of misrule; and that was not known to exist until the "\$20,000 beauties"—the special auditors—discovered that the city had not reached the limit of indebtedness for sewer and water purposes by \$628,000. But the minute this fact was discovered, the "patriots" began to plot how to take advantage of this provision and get hold of that \$600,000. The same day that the \$600,000. The same day that the special auditors made the announce-ment that the debt limit of the city had not been reached, the announce-ment was made that an ordinance authorizing this indebtedness should be submitted to the voters of the city, with the confident hope that the vot-ers would approve the further bond-ing of their property in the sum of \$600,000, for the ostensible purpose of extending the sewer and water-

works systems.

With the city plunged into debt; with a quarter of a million dollars worth of unpaid warrants outstanding; with the bank clamoring for its ing; with the bank clamoring for its money, the necessity is plain—there is nothing else to do: the city has got to have the money, hence the bond issue must go through, and the small matter of juggling the funds, when once the money is in the treasury, is an easy matter to handle for such financial experts as the "American" council majority. council majority.
