

## PLANNING FOR INCREASE OF BEETS

Farmers of Boxelder County are Urged to Build Reservoirs.

## SUGAR COMPANY OFFERS AID.

Beet Growers on East Side of Bear River Must Take Steps to Save Water for Dry Months.

Work on the beet crop for next year has already begun in earnest. The fertile soil had no sooner given up its yield of beets than the enterprising farmer had commenced putting it in shape again to receive next spring's planting.

A new order of things has been instituted on the east side of the Bear River valley, which, it is hoped, will enable the farmers there to be as sure of a beet crop next year as their more fortunate brethren on the west side. Hon. George Austin, agricultural superintendent of the Utah Sugar company, has just returned from a visit to the Honeyville and Develville districts, in company with Engineer Wheelon, W. H. Lewis, John M. Austin, John Lewis, and Mr. Hammond of the Hammond Canal company. Mr. Austin held a meeting with the farmers at Honeyville and Develville on Wednesday last and pointed out to them the urgent necessity for all farmers on the east side of Bear river to join together in the construction of small reservoirs to be built under the canal. These reservoirs will hold sufficient water to take care of a portion of the beet crop during the dry months of July and August. As everyone remembers, the Bear river was so low during those months this year that the east side farmers suffered severely from lack of water, and narrowly escaped the loss of their crops.

It has been demonstrated that the Bear River valley is probably one of the best localities for sugar beet culture in the United States. The west side is amply provided with late water, but during the past season, the Bear river fell so low that about the 10th of July it was necessary to turn all the water out of the east side canal, and there was no doubt that the sugar beets would have suffered very materially, and in many cases been worthless.

It was brought very forcibly before the farmers at the meeting, that it was imperative that they protect themselves against what might be a disaster in another season. Said Mr. Austin today: "I was shown by figures that small reservoirs, covering an area of about ten acres, and holding an average depth of five feet of water could be constructed to the lay of the country, which is admirably adapted for this purpose, at a cost of about \$1,200 each. This water, allowing 25 per cent for waste, should irrigate 75 acres of beets as well as other crops. This would save the farmer back the first year, for his outlay."

This method of reservoiring in Utah county on the Sugar company farms, has been very successful during the past 10 or 12 years and this fact is illustrated to the farmers in such a way that Mr. Austin says no doubt something will be done along the lines proposed.

There is no reason why there should not be a system of reservoirs constructed from south of Honeyville to near Collinston, which would be ample for all parties, and instead of the farmers waiting for some big company to construct large reservoirs for them, this system would be right at their doors, and owned by themselves. Besides the work of building could be carried on this winter, as it is all scraper work, and nearly all farmers have from two to three teams standing around doing little in the winter.

Mr. Austin offered on behalf of the Sugar company, to furnish a surveyor to locate the reservoir sites, free of charge, and also to assist in the construction work, by furnishing some of the Sugar company's teams to help the farmers out.

The farmers seemed to be very much interested in the proposition and Mr. Austin believes something will be done this winter. At the Develville meeting his ideas were vigorously backed up by Messrs. Wheelon, Lewis and others.

## IN BEHALF OF BOTHA.
