LOCAL BRIEFS.

Attorney Charles Baldwin has appointed additional U. S. commissioners for this county, to serve for four years.

The University Sunday school convened in Barratt hall yesterday at 12:30 p. m. In the absence of the instructors of theology, class A, Prof. Mills addressed the whole assembly, delivering an interesting and instructive lecture on "Alma, the Younger."

Clyde Baxter, who was killed in the Old Hickory mine at Milford, by a premature explosion, was buried Saturday afternoon, his funeral being attended by a large concourse of friends. He was a young man who was very well thought of.

Manager Channing of the Utah Consolidated Mining company has announced a raise in wages for a portion of the employees of the Highland Boy smelter. The skimmers will advance from \$2.50 to \$3.00 per day, and the trimmers will receive an increase of 10 cents per day.

Engineer T. P. Rigney has returned from Goldfield, where he says there are a large number of newspaper men, largely from Denver, who are out in that country for what they can make, and thus escape future dependency on the rigorous exactions of newspaper work for a livelihood.

Mrs. Mary Drake was examined as to her sanity in Judge Armstrong's court on Saturday afternoon by County Physician Whitney and Dr. H. S. Scott, and was committed to the state mental hospital at Provo. It is believed that her condition was caused by grief over the loss of her two children recently.

Prof. Byron Cummings of the University of Utah will deliver an illustrated lecture on Greek temples, before the High school alumni next Thursday evening. A musical program will also be rendered. The entire amount will be at the assembly room of the West Side High school, and friends of the alumni are cordially invited to be present. It is expected that the new alumni will be ready for delivery at that time. The executive committee has decided not to notify members of these meetings by individual notices.

George D. McDill, railroad secretary, International committee, of the Y. M. C. A. at Chicago, is visiting today with Secretary Cox of the Salt Lake association. Mr. McDill is out in this country in connection with the building of the railroad. Y. M. C. ARRESTED ON SERIOUS CHARGE.

Chinaman Alleged to Have Attempted an Assault on a Little Girl.

OCCURRED AT FOREST DALE.

Crime Recalls the Mortensen Murder Case and the Burial of James R. Hay.

Little Beatrice Seegers, the 11-year-old daughter of Arthur Seegers, who resides in Forest Dale, was the victim of an attempted criminal assault at the hands of a Chinaman named Lee Yon on Friday afternoon, but was rescued from the clutches of the brute by her mother just as she was about to overcome with exhaustion from her fierce struggle for liberty. Owing to negligence on the part of a neighbor of the Seegers, the officers were not notified of the assault until yesterday afternoon. In less than an hour after Deputy Sheriff Edwards and his men were notified, they had the Chinaman under arrest and he had been positively identified by Mrs. Seegers as the assailant of her little daughter.

Beatrice, with her little brother, was sent to Lee's hut, located on Fifth East, between Twelfth and Thirteenth South streets, after some delay. Upon their arrival they stated their errand to the man who immediately seized the little girl. A struggle ensued between the Chinaman and the girl, assisted by her brother. The screams of the two children attracted the attention of Mrs. Seegers, who could plainly see the struggle from her kitchen door. She rushed frantically to the aid of the girl and rescued her from the man and took her home. The Chinaman continued with his work in the celery field just as though nothing had happened.

When Mr. Seegers returned home Friday evening he was told of the affair and immediately went to a neighbor to telephone for the police. The neighbor, however, told him that he was going to see the county attorney on Saturday morning and could attend to the matter for him. This he failed to do, and when Mr. Seegers found out yesterday afternoon that the officials had not been notified, he at once attended to the matter himself, with the result that in a short time, Lee was arrested and lodged in jail.

The scene of the crime is near the point where James R. Hay was buried after being fatally murdered by Peter Mortensen several years ago, and it is from the Chinaman's hut that the shovel with which the grave was dug, was supposed to have been taken by Mortensen.

BLACK ON BONDS.

Has Resolution to Present in Relation To Sale of Bonds Locally.

At the meeting of the city council tonight Councilman Black will introduce an amendment to Hewlett's bond resolution which will provide that out of every \$200,000 issue of bonds, \$50,000 of the same shall be open for sale locally by public subscription so as to allow the purchasers a chance to get in on the bonds. Black proposes that the bonds shall be issued in blocks of not less than \$500 nor more than \$3,500. Should there be any of the \$50,000 not subscribed for, whatever remains will be awarded to the bidder who takes the \$150,000 end of the block.

BURLINGTON VS. NORTHWESTERN.

Bitter Struggle Now on Between The Two Roads in State of Wyoming.

COMING TO UTAH AND IDAHO.

Both Lines Will Extend This Spring —At Present Thermopolis and Montana Are the Goal.

(Special to the "News.")

Cheyenne, Wyo., Jan. 23.—A bitter struggle is now on between the Burlington and Chicago & Northwestern railroads for a right-of-way and other privileges in the vicinity of Thermopolis, in the Big Horn basin. Saturday the Burlington railroad applied to the state board of charities and reform for an exclusive right-of-way through the Big Horn canyon and across the state reserve at Thermopolis, but the request will probably not be granted. Both the Northwestern and Burlington are buying surveys to build a road looking to the building of lines to the Wind River Indian reservation, in central Wyoming, which is to be sold to the government next June. The Northwestern is extending its line west from Casper, while the Burlington is to build south from its Taluca-Cody line. The Northwestern will not stop at the road, a few weeks from the Burlington, but will extend westward to build on northwesterly through the Big Horn country in Montana.

The canyon of the Big Horn furnishes the only feasible route of entering Thermopolis from the north, and the reservation from the north, and likewise it is the only practicable route for a line building through from Casper to the northwest, and both the Burlington and Northwestern are fighting hard for possession of this valuable defile in the mountains.

Both roads have run surveys through the canyon, and the Beigo-American Drilling and Tunneling Co., which proposes to build the Wyoming Central, set grade stakes there last fall.

The state board is not disposed to grant exclusive rights to any one company, and in all probability the Burlington, if that company builds through the canyon first, will be compelled to grant the rival companies the use of its tracks over that portion of the road.

The outcome of the race is being watched with keen interest by railroad men all over the country. The Burlington will begin work at Thermopolis in a few days, its Thermopolis road. From Thermopolis, the line will be extended westward through the Kirwin mining district, thence through south of the Yellowstone park, down Snake river, and into Idaho and Utah.

FIRST OVER ROUTE.

J. L. Moore of Pedro Traffic Department Arrives From Los Angeles.

To J. L. Moore, district freight and passenger agent of the San Pedro, is ascribed the honor of being the first member of the traffic department of the Salt Lake route to come from Los Angeles to Salt Lake over the route of the new road. Mr. Moore arrived in Salt Lake this morning, having left Los Angeles on Wednesday night and put in practically two days in the road. He reached the California end on Friday and found the tracklayers hard at work with 1/2 miles to close up. He said that the gangs expected to lay the rails by Saturday night. Of the grade he reports a little over a mile remaining, mostly heavy rock work. All hands, he says, are straining every muscle to clean up by Feb. 1. Between Los Vegas and Caliente, says Mr. Moore, the track is in splendid condition, in fact better time is made than at this end of the road. This condition he affirms, holds good on the new track completed to date.

Mr. Moore says that there is considerable interest shown in the road in California and during the two weeks he has been here he has been asked questions regarding conditions in Utah and Nevada.

J. W. WALTON GETS IT.

Salt Lake Boy Appointed Chief Clerk at Burlington Agency.

General Agent Neslen this morning announced the appointment of J. W. Walton, a young Salt Lake boy, as chief clerk at the Salt Lake agency of the Burlington. Mr. Walton comes from the headquarters of the Salt Lake route at Los Angeles, but has been considering the railway in Salt Lake, his home town, with the passenger department of the Rio Grande, the Pullman service, and in the office of the general superintendent of the R. G. W. line as well here and the selection is bound to prove a popular one.

Powell of the system from Washington, D. C.; Mrs. Spencer, Miss Humphrey and Miss Hussey of Louisville complete the list of Mr. Spencer's guests.

1866—William Pitt, the younger, British statesman, died, born 1759. The talented son of the great Chatham entered parliament at the age of 22. Two years later he became prime minister and had to contend against Fox, Burke, North and Sheridan. Being defeated in parliament he appealed to the people with triumph and soon became the most powerful orator in Europe. His death was attributed to vexation over the failure of his efforts against Napoleon, and the victories of the French in the Austro-Italian campaign.

1812—George Clymer, "signer" for Pennsylvania, died at Morrisville, Pa.; born in Philadelphia 1739.

1884—Philip Brooks, the celebrated preacher and Episcopal bishop of Massachusetts died in Boston; born 1825.
