LOCAL BRIEFS.

Westminster college has opened for
 the fall term with a large attendance
 and good prospects.

The Utah State Pictures company's
 bankrupt stock will be bought up by
 local parties and the business continued.

The Daughters of the Confederacy
 are holding in the Kenyon parlors this
 afternoon, the first meeting of the new
 organization, and a program for the en-
 suing year is being outlined.

It is officially announced that the
 outlines for Religion Class work will
 be ready for delivery next week, and
 superintendents should immediately
 send in their orders to Joseph J. Can-
 non.

S. D. Dredrick assigned his tobacco
 stock yesterday afternoon, to Manager
 J. Q. Critchlow of the Utah Credit
 Men's association. His claimables are
 \$600, and the assets are claimed to equal
 this figure.

Carl A. Carlgren, aged 64, died yes-
 terday of dropsy at his home, 1388
 south Seventh East street. The de-
 cessed came to this city recently from
 Sweden, and was a miner. He leaves a wife and three children.
 The funeral will be held tomorrow, at
 1 p. m., from the Waterloo meeting-
 house.

Col. William M. Palmer and Capt.
 Conrad Schwarer, G. A. R. veterans,
 from New Jersey, are registered at the
 Knutsford on their way to the coast.
 They say they will remain here until
 after the election, then go to the Denver
 encampment in addition to the 20,000 veterans,
 and that the old feeling between the two
 great sections of the country has en-
 tirely died out.
