# LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Thermometer.—The mercury succeeded in climbing up to 80° to-day.

Frost Again.—A severe frost in the lower wards last night down potatoes, tomato, melon and squash vines, besides corn, beans, &c.

From the South.—Bishop John Sharp has returned from a brief trip down the Utah Southern Railroad.

Notice.—The members of Zion's Musical Society will please meet at the New Tabernacle, on Monday next, September 1st, at eight o'clock p.m.

Sunday Services.—Sunday schools in session at 10 a.m.; meeting in the Tabernacle at 2 p.m., and in the various wards in the evening as usual.

Home missionaries will be in attendance at the latter.

Home Again.—Rob. W. Sloan, of the Herald, returned to-day from a two weeks' trip to Canby Valley. His journey was successful from a business point of view, and his improved and ready appearance speaks volumes for the hospitality, attention and excellent road dispersed by the good people, he has just left.

Personal.—Rev. A. F. Sherrill, of Omaha, Prof. Edward Bonner, and Miss A. M. Keith, made a pleasant call at our office to-day, and were shown through the different departments of the establishment. Prof. Bonner and Miss Keith commenced their labors in the Academy in this city, on Monday next.

The defendants and their attorneys will please take notice, that upon the compliance and answers in said cause now on file herein, and upon all the files and records of said Court at the Court Room thereof, in the city and county of Salt Lake, Territory of Utah, on the 8th day of September, 1879, at that day, or at some other day, as counsel can be heard for an order of the court that you give the plaintiffs herein, or their attorneys, an inspection, and copy or permission to take a copy of all the books and papers, and accounts relating to the claim of John Taylor as Trustee in Trust of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, against the estate of Brigham Young, deceased, a copy of which is herewith attached, and marked "Exhibit A" and of all books, documents, papers and accounts relating to each and every item thereof. Also all books, receipts, papers and documents relating to the sale, transfer or disposition of the 413 Utah Central Railroad bonds mentioned in Exhibit B of said "Salt Lake County" Territory, report of the doings of Geo. Miss Smoot has been a careful and energetic teacher in Provo for many years, and many friends will regret her retirement from that vocation. In appreciation of her past labors in the Academy, the Board and Faculty have presented her with a handsomely executed testimonial.

Shellenbaker were shot in ambush, near the Santa Rita Mountains, Arizona, overhauled the stage at Phoenix, Arizona, a few days ago. They obtained \$725 worth of valuables; 275 Mexican dollars, \$100 in gold coin, a pair of \$40 buckles, a \$35 check and the remainder in currency.

Sanpete News.—Bro. Geo. Farnsworth, a resident of Mt. Pleasant, Sanpete County, and a former attaché of the News, is in the city on business. He is always a welcome visitor at our office and especially when he gives good reports of the condition of the people in his section of country. The grain crop, though only about two-thirds of the common yield, is better than was expected. The hay and potato crops are almost total failures.

Water is scarce and nearly everything is in a parched, perishing condition. The people feel well, and wait for the Temple to be carried forward. Many of the people of Sanpete and Sevier counties have found remunerative employment on the railroad extension, most of which work, however, is now in the hands of men from Millard and Beaver counties.

Base Ball.—Yesterday's game between the Danvers and Deserets was a stubborn contest, decided only after ten innings had been played. Until near the close of the game the Danvers were ahead, and the opinion was general that they would win the game. In the eighth inning the Deserets made some tremendous hits, and closed the inning with a score of 10 to 10.

In the ninth inning neither side made a run, but in the tenth the Deserets scored two, winning the game with a score of 13 to 10.

The final match of the series is being played this afternoon, and to-morrow morning the visitors—a party of jovial fellows and good ball-players—start for their Colorado home, a defeated but by no means a discouraged nine.

Home East.—The Congressional Committee, charged with investigating the causes of depression in labor, who have been spending some days in San Francisco, passed through Ogden this morning on their return to the east. The members of the party are all in excellent health and spirits, and express their delight with the result of their visit to the west.

McNee, for stabbing Chas. Marden was bound over in \$1,000 bonds.

Annual Excursion.—On Tuesday next the pupils of the 16th Ward Sabbath and Day Schools, accompanied by their parents, relatives and friends, will take an out to Lake Shore. The excursionists will have the use of the bath houses, and boating, swimming, dancing, base ball, etc., will be indulged in. The train leaves the depot at 8:40 a.m. and returns to the city at 6:45. Free Concert.—On Friday evening some of the pupils of the 16th School District, under the direction of their able teacher, Mr. A. Parsons, prepared for the citizens of the district and others, a very nice treat in the shape of a free concert. The parts performed consisted of songs and dialogues, interspersed with a few touches of the dramatic art. A large and respectable audience manifested their appreciation of the talents and good will of the scholars and their leader. The pieces were rendered in a style that would do credit to older performers. A well deserved vote of thanks was tendered to the leader and scholars at the close of the entertainment.

"Dispatch" Items.—The friends of J. F. Graham, the alleged Central Pacific defaulting cashier, yesterday made a successful application to have the amount of bail reduced from \$20,000 to \$15,000, and are today trying to obtain suitable bondsmen, but indications are that they will be unsuccessful.

The High School building, dedicated a few days ago, will be built by Mr. Wm. Fife, Mr. Obed Taylor of Salt Lake City being the architect. The building is to be 70 feet long, 40 feet high, and 50 feet wide. An observatory will adorn the roof, and give an imposing appearance to the structure which, when completed, will be the most elegant and convenient for school purposes in Utah.

Stabbing Affray.—Last evening about 9 o'clock two men, Charles Marden, of the 5th Ward, and Alexander McNee, of Park city, engaged in a quarrel in Ordner's saloon, Second South Street. It appears from the statement of witnesses that a pigeon shooting match which took place yesterday, between Watson and Marden, two noted shots, furnished the basis for the difficulty. Marden urging the merits and skill of Watson, while McNee maintained for his friend Marden a greater ability in trigger pulling. Though unknown to each other, the two men talked quite warmly over the matter until finally, McNee went to the door and invited Marden to follow him. The latter did so, and when the sidewalk was reached, he was knocked down by his powerful assailant, stamped and kicked in the face and stabbed in two places. He got up and ran into the saloon, asked for a weapon, which however he did not receive, and afterwards got into a buggy and drove to find a policeman. On returning from the City Hall he met an officer who had already arrested McNee. The latter was locked up in jail, and Marden's wounds were dressed by Dr. Richards. The cuts, one of which is on the jaw, the other on the shoulder, are painful but not dangerous.

The two combatants were before Justice Tupper this morning. McNee waived an examination, and gave \$1,000 bonds for his appearance if wanted by the grand jury.

Another version of the trouble is that McNee had engaged in a fight with some of Marden's friends earlier in the evening, and been badly beaten, after which he went up town, borrowed the dagger, and returned with the intention of getting even with them. It is also said that both men were under the influence of liquor. The first statement of the case is generally considered to be the correct one, and if it is McNee will have something unpleasant to answer for.
