The story of the arrest of Mr. Opffer is typical of the Russian methods of suppression. When the condition of suppression. When the condition of Finland became of moment on account of the Russian-Japanese war, Mr. Opf-fer wrote his criticisms of the country's rule, and Russian officials brought the matter to the attention of the car, de-termined that no agitation of Finland should occur in Denmark. Consequentbround occur in Denmark. Consequent-ly messengers were sent to King Chris-tian, orging the editor's arrest. Ho learned of the matter and of the fact that he had been sonteneed to pay a fine of 50,000 crowns in addition to serving a term in prison, in time to escape before he was taken into custody. On the night of Dec. 12, while officers were searching his home for him, he eshas since been a tourist, determined to visit all countries save only Fluesia.
