TALK OF THE TOWN.

Lots of people in town. Attend your Sabbath meetings. The breath of winter is felt perceptibly. The Melville engagement opens on the 20th. The engine for the Match Factory has arrived. Potatoes are going up in price and out of the Territory. Home missionaries will visit the city wards to-morrow night. The Home Dramatic Club will present "Queen's Evidence" one week from to-night. Captain Hooper is reported ill at Soda Springs. The rumor, we are happy to say, is incorrect. A fire on the Church Farm, Wells-ville, is reported to have burned up several hundred bushels of grain. "Chawles" is as enterprising as ever. A case of drunkenness, and one of intoxication and insulting conduct, were before the police court to-day. The first carload of dried fruit this season has been shipped east by the enterprising merchant, S. P. Teasdale, Esq. "East Lynne" was played as a matinee to-day, by the Thompson troupe, and witnessed by a very good sized audience. A small boy, named Walter Rich-ardson, was accidentally shot on Thurs-day evening, and taken to St. Mary's Hospital. Assistant Superintendent James Sharp and Auditor H. S. Young, of the Utah Central Railway, are back from the south. W. W. Ritter, Esq., is reported to be lying ill with typhoid fever, the same disease from which his wife fell a victim the other day. Mr. B. B. Young left for Europe this morning. He will be accom-panied as far as New York, by his brother-in-law, Mr. T. J. McIntosh. An old gentleman named Ander-son was knocked down by a horse, while on a crossing the other even-ing. He is still confined to his bed. Jas. T. Edwards, who was badly hurt by a fall from a tree on the Den-der and South Park Railroad, re-mains in much the same condition as last reported. Bishop John Sharp went south this afternoon, in company with Messrs. Francken and Hill, the president and manager of the Horn Gorge Mining Company. George Gardiner, of Bear Lake, on the 2d inst., accidentally stepped on a cut of saw in motion, at the U. S. steam mill, Logan Canyon, and had four of his toes severed. An exciting but harmless run-ning took place last evening. A lady in a buggy was whirled away for several blocks, but escaped unhurt. Frank W. Jennings, Esq., of the flourishing mercantile firm of Wm. Jennings & Son, returned from the west last evening. He has pur-chased largely for the firm during his absence. Messrs. Joseph, Pitts and Alexan-der Watson, under the direction of Supervisor Livingston, are making a fine job of the sidewalks north-west of the Continental Hotel. Let the good work go on. A Word to Correspondents.—A

short time since we received a com-munication from Clifton, stating that the name of that town had been changed to Cammerville, and requesting the correction of an in-discreet error in relation thereto which had appeared in a former edition of this paper. Not understanding the full purport of the missive, we made no allusion to the correction, but merely announced the fact of the misnomer having been made, and suggesting the place in question to be Clifton, Idaho, as stated. It now appears that Clifton, Iron County, was meant by our correspondent, who writes again requesting this new error to be corrected. We say this much in relation to a small matter in order to show newspaper correspondents how matters are apt to get mixed unless in their writings they are particular about giving full names, dates and other useful in-formation. We are aware that an editor is popularly supposed to know the exact name, age and birth-place of each of his subscri-bers, the dimensions of the house each reader lives in, and the full ped-igree of all his ancestors, but such is really not the case. When a cor-respondent writes that "John" did so and so, we are not at all certain whether it is John Smith or John Jones that did it, and are therefore compelled either to omit mention-ing it altogether, or give a blind guess and make a big blunder. Again when a man writes that such and such an event occurred "down here, yesterday," and then forgets to date the letter or name the place from which it was written, we are in a quandary equally as embarrass-ing, and though ever so anxious to oblige our correspondent by put-ting his item in print, are obli-ged to suppress it or else re-nder him and the paper ridiculous by giving it publicity. It is often the same when the name of a town is given without its county, especially when there are two towns of the same name as in the case cited. Volume might be added upon this subject, but would only point the same moral, which, in brief, is as fol-lows: Consider newspaper men as knowing no more than ordinary people, (which by the way is simply the truth) and in dealing with them act rightly upon that principle. Self! "Jane Eyre."—The favorable opinion formed of the merits of the Charlotte Thompson dramatic com-pany by their opening performance, was strengthened by their admir-able presentation of the intensely interesting play of "Jane Eyre" last evening. It is a drama of absorbing, often thrilling interest, and was played in a very effective manner. Miss Thompson, in the title role, gave additional evidence of her rare powers as an emotional actress, and materially increased her prestige with the public. Miss Adams, as the heartless and unprincipled Mrs. Reed, had a disagreeable part, but portrayed it with much fidelity. The other ladies, including "Little Maud," also acquitted themselves with credit. Mr. Craig personated "Lord Rochester" in a very able manner, and won new laurels by his fine and careful acting. Mr. Wilson as the "hazarding" Jacob, created a great deal of mirth, and his "Brocklehurst" (double) was also well done. Mr. Wooderson, as "John Reed" and "Frederick Lynne" con-secutively, showed his versatile in-terests to renewed advantage, and Mr. Persico and the rest of the gentle-men made the most of their charac-ters. The play differs considerably from the story, in that the more un-pleasant features of the latter are either expunged or greatly modified. The changes, in fact, are all for the better, and in the present state, "Jane Eyre" is an excellent little play as anyone would wish to see. This evening, the "Planter's Wife" is to be repeated, and the Thompson engagement will be brought to a close. Another One Bagged.—W. W. Forbes, the Denver and Rio Grande embezzler, one of the prisoners who escaped from the County Jail last Sunday afternoon, was recaptured this morning by officers John Y. Smith and Wm. Salmon. He was found in the attic of a disreputable haunt in an alley opposite the Wal-ker House, and was snugly enscon-ced in a room alone by himself. He had his beard shaved, but was de-tected by the expression of his eye. "His eye like a eagle." The police knew that he had been a ha-bitue of the place in reference, and on learning that he was in town, knew immediately where they could place their hands upon him. He had been south as far as rapidly, in company with Smith and Reynolds, the two prisoners yet at large, but was known to have returned to town. He was arrested at 4 o'clock this morning.
