BELL ARRESTED IN KANSAS CITY

Bogus Policeman in the Famous

McWhirter Robbery in
Clutches of Law.

GOOD WORK OF THE SHERIFF.

He is the Man Who Gave Receipt for

Stolen Cash and Made Deal

With Sheets.

Kansas City, Mo., May 7.—William S. Bell, alias W. W. Bell, alias C. C. Cunningham, alias F. F. Matthews, was arrested here tonight by a deputy sheriff from Salt Lake City, on the charge of conspiracy and grand larceny in connection with the alleged robbery of two Scotch tourists, Alexander and William McWhirter, who were robbed of \$10,000 in Salt Lake City by a band of swindlers who, it is alleged, enjoyed the protection of the police there.

The prisoner said he would resist extradition proceedings. He said that he traveled 10,000 miles and spent \$1,500 trying to escape arrest.

The above dispatch bearing the information of the arrest of W. W. Bell, the bogus policeman in the Anders rooming house in this city on Sept. 19, last, will not be read with very great pleasure or satisfaction around police headquarters and particularly by Chief George Stevens, who was recently discharged from the conspiracy charge against him on a technicality. With the arrest of Bell and the evidence which has been secured from him, the case in all probability be able to convict all of the men now under arrest in connection with the bold robbery by which the two young Scotchmen were relieved of \$10,000.

Sheriff Emery and Deputy Sheriff Joe Sharp have labored for several months in an attempt to locate Bell and his associates. Bell has been located west and south and as far east as Omaha. In the latter place he came very near being captured, but was given a tip by a friend and escaped. A few hours before the officers arrived, he was finally located in Kansas City and the officers there kept a watch on him until Night. Bell was taken to the county jail and placed in the city. In order to avoid publicity Deputy Sheriff Sharp was not sent to Kansas City after Bell because the prisoner had been arrested in Salt Lake City and his departure from the city again would at once bring forth comment from the papers and probably result in his being arrested.

He played the part of a bogus policeman in the robbery and it was he that took the money from McWhirter and gave him a receipt for it and later sent it to the police station to report the matter to Chief Stevens. Bell also secured the \$10,000 of the money which was paid back to McWhirter in the name of Chief Stevens.

The only men not under arrest who were connected with the case are Jack and Larry O'Brien and Sheriff Emery will not let them until he has added further labels to his department by capturing them.

Sheriff Emery will leave for Kansas City tonight to assist in bringing back Bell. County Attorney Hanson today made out the necessary receiving papers for the return of Bell to this state, and they were promptly approved by Governor John C. Dyer.

DIPHTHERIA LEADS.

Interesting Vital Statistics Compiled By the Board of Health.

The April report of the city board of health shows that no cases of spinal meningitis were reported during the month. The report further shows that 89 deaths occurred during the period, as against 67 in the same month last year. During the first four months of the year, 352 deaths have occurred in this city, 15 of which occurred in January, 105 in February, 81 in March and 80 in April. Twenty-seven of the April deaths occurred in hospitals, and 25 were non-residents.

During the month 77 cases of contagious diseases were reported, of which 17 were of diphtheria, 7 of scarlet fever, 1 of smallpox, 1 of whooping cough and 2 of mumps; others scattering. There were 170 marriages during April and 159 births, of which 78 were males and 81 females. The sanitary inspector made 591 inspections during the month, and carted away 1,490 loads of ash, rubbish, etc., while at the same time 255 loads of garbage were disposed of. Horses to the number of 25 were cremated, and 109 dogs.
