Bell played the part of a bogus police-man in the robbery and it was he that took the money from McWhirter and gave him a receipt for it and later went with McWhirter to the police station to report the matter to Chief Sheets. Bell also secured the \$1,000 of the money which was pald back to McWhirter in the presence of Chief Sheets. The only men not under arrest who were connected with the case are Jack and Larry O'Brien and Sheriff Emery will not give up until he has added further laurels to his department by capturing them.
