bursting of water jackets and leaking of radiators. Now the commissioner of internal revenue at Washington has started to give his attention to water cooling, and he has created what, if his suspicions have any foundation, will be a new cause of trouble with that system. He has given a decision that automobile dealers proparing a stock of a "non-freezing mixture" for their customers must pay a special government tax if the product contains 30 per cent or more of alcohol. Wood alcohol is the kind com-monly used, but the commissioner is ap-prehensive that under the guise of a "non-freezing solution" some new kind of infoxicating drink will be distributed in prohibition states either in bulk or by passing automobilists.

Silli the local automobile trade con-tinues to improve and dealers are "rush-ed to death" with orders which they are having a hard time to fill. Salt Lakers who purchased cars months ago are clamoring for them and the sales-man has run out of excuses trying to explain that the railroads are way be-hind in handling the shipments and that the factories are working over time. There is scarcely a dealer in the city who does not expect a shipment of cars some time this week. The cost of maintaing and repair-ing the 1,800 miles of good roads in New York state during the next year is estimated at \$1,500,000. The federal government has added one to the list of troubles which, according to the advocates of air cooling, are al-ways an accompaniment of the cooling of an automobile engine by means of water. As water will freeze while air will not, freezing troubles are found only with water-cooled engines, which fact causes the use with the latter of as close an approach to what is known as an "anti-freezing solution" as can be obtained. With an air-cooled motor car, such as the Franklin, the engine itself is "anti-freezing," and so there is no bursting of water jackets and leaking of radiators.

For nearly a year E. S. Henderson of Salt Lake City has been operating a Franklin automobile with Syracuse air in the tirds. If was sent from the Franklin factory in Syracuse last July. "There has been only five pounds of air added to the back thres since it was shipped," says Mr. Henderson, "so I am operating yet on Syracuse air. I have not had a puncture and no tire repairs whatever. It has cost me about 2 cents per mile to operate."

Milwaukee, Wis., will spend nearly \$100,000 this year for street sprinkling and dust laying. Experiments with a new anti-dust preparation that can be produced chearly have been success-ful and the streets will be given periodi-cal treatment.
