PARLORS IN ALONZO E. HYDE'S RESIDENCE.

The above cut shows the parlors in the residence of Alonzo E. Hyde, on North Temple street. The rooms are on the west side and are handsomely furnished in light mauve tints with tapestries in pale green. The woodwork in the front parlor is in bird's-eye maple, and that in the rear room of black birch. The mantels are handsomely carved, and the fire place in the front room is tiled with onyx. A pretty feature of this room is the tower window or the southwest, which aids materially in the artistic effect of the interior. A notable feature of the house is the hall, the front entry having a floor of handsome tiles, and the walls and ceiling done in bronze stucco, with art figures in panel effect, representing Spring, on either side. Swing doors of art glass separate the entry from the hall, which extends almost the length of the house. A finely carved staircase is situated at the rear end of the hall, having a spray of electric globes in palm effect capping the newel post, and a stained glass window representing an Egyptian scene, at the first landing. The library and sitting room are on the east side of the house, the woodwork in both being of maple, and both being well lit with large bay windows. The bedrooms and bathroom are upstairs, and are in keeping with the comfort and convenience of the rest of the building.
