MANSLAUGHTER CHARGED.

Against Mrs. D. N. Neely for Not Call. ing Doctor to See Sick Child.

Kalamazoo, Mich., Jan. 9 .- The coro ner's jury at Plainwell, which has been injuiring into the death there of Walter Neeley, aged 2½ years, son of Mr. and Mrs. David N. Neeley of Sacramento, Cal., brought in a verdict this afternoon finding that the child died of pluero-pneumonia, and declaring the mother guilty of gross negligence for failing to secure the service of a hysician or to call in medical attendance.

The child was treated by two members of a sect of mental healers.

No responsibility, it is declared, attaches to the father, who was in California during the child's sickness and death. The verdict declares Mrs. Wilmont of Grand Rapids and Mrs. Mary L. Blood of Kalamazoo, who treated the child, are guility of gross negligence in not doing anything to learn the nature of the disease or calling in a physician.

TO SUE NORTHERN PACIFIC.

For Violation of the Sixteen Hour Employment Law.

Helena, Mont., Jan. 9.—The state board of rallroad commissioners today directed the attorney-general to file three actions in the district court against the Northern Pacific Railroad company, alleging violations of the sixteen-houremployment law for emploes in the train servise; and of the "dinkey" caboose law and for non-observance of a regulation prohibiting the collection of more than 10 cents excess where cash fares are paid on trains.

NEW NATIONAL

President Signs Proclamation Creating One on Verde River Watershed.

IT COMPRISES 721,780 ACRES

Headquarters of United Verde Copper Mines Situated in North Part of Forest-Grazing Not Prohibited.

Washington, Jan. 10 .- The president has just signed a proclamation creating the Verde national forest in Arizona. This new national forest has an area of 721,780 acres and is located in Maricopa and Yavapai counties. It lies on the west side of the Verde river and includes a large portion of the watershed of this stream. Jerome, the headquarters of the United Verge Copper mine, is situated in the northern part of this forest. West and southwest of Jerome are the Mingus mountains. There is a small area of commercial forest which has been badiy abused in the past, but, which under proper management, will furnish a small local supply of timber to the mining camp.

COVERED WITH BRUSH. The greater part of the area of this forest is covered with a growth of brush without commercial value. The protection of this, however, is just as important as heavily forested land, for, as in the case in southern Cairfornia, this scrabby growth is the for, as in the case in southern California, this scrubby growth is the only thing that conserves the water supply and protects the watershed of the Verde river from serious erosion. The creation of this new national forest is considered necessary by the reclamation service for the best administration of the reclamation act, and the watershed has an important relation to the full development of the irrigable lands of Sait river valley. relation to the full development of the irrigable lands of Salt river vailey. In order that the rieh lands in this part of Arizona be brought to their highest development the watershed of the Verde river will be protected from damage through wasteful lumbering and overgrazing. Many parts of the forest have suffered from overgrazing by large bands of goats, and the protection of the bursh cover will prevent further erosion and impairment vent further erosion and impairment of the wat supply.

GRAZING NOT PROHIBITED.

The forest service will by no means The forest service will by no means prohibit grazing on this new forest, but will endeavor so to regulate it that the watershed of the Verde river will not be injured. In this way an important source of water which converges toward Salt river and its tributaries will be protected for the ultimate development of the irrigated lands.

Boston, Jan. 9.—That the split in the ranks of the Democratic party in Massachusetts, manifested at the momorable state convention at Springfield last October, is still wide open, was shown today at a meeting in this this city of 27 out of the 56 members of the state committee. Many members of the committee refused to at of the state committee. Many memters of the committee refused to attend the meeting and declared they would heed the call for what they consider the regular meeting of the committee tomorrow. The call for today's meeting was issued by William S. McNary of Boston, second vice chairman of last year's state convention. The call for tomorrow's meeting is by John P. Feeney of Woodburn, chairman of the state committee. It is expected that there will be two state conventions this spring. be two state conventions this spring, be two state conventions this spring, and that the claim of the two sets of Democratis to the Denver convention will have to be adjudicated by the Democratic national committee.

The call today was sent to the \$8 members of the committee who were

chosen at the district caucuses last September, and also to the 18 members at large chosen at the Whitney convertion in Springfield, which was subsequently decided by the ballot law commission of the state to have been

subsequently decided by the ballot law commissive of the state to take been the regular Democratic state convention. The call for tomorrow's blocking has been sent to the same district numbers at also to the mambers at lacke chosen by the Barilett convention at Smargfield.

Of the 27 members who gathered at the Quincy house this afternoon, three members later withdrew on what they claimed "unfair treatment by the chairman." At the conclusion of the meeting, which lasted about two hours, Mr. McNary announced that the Demomeeting, which lasted about two hours, Mr. McNary announced that the Democratic state committee of the state had organized for the year by the election of officers and the adoption of a set of rules and by taking preliminary steps toward the calling of the spring convention.

The officers of today's meetings were authorized to call caucuses to elect delegates to the spring convention at which delegates will be elected to the national convention.

Reno, Nev., Jan. 9.—Fully 1,000 union men attended a mass meeting here tonight, called for securing an expression of Reno unions on the labor situation are Goldfield. Resolutions upholding Gov. Sparks in calling for troops were introduced and seconded, but were voted down amid hisses. Resolutions were then passed stating that the troops were an unnecessary expense, were called without cause, and that it was the sense of those assembled that the primary purpose for bringing the troops to Goldfield was to reduce wages and aim a direct blow at organized labor in Nevada. Members of the state legislature who spoke were decried as enemies of union labor for upholding the call for troops.
