"Since the Supreme Court of the United States has decided that the Act of Cangress prohibiting poly-gamy is not unconstitutional, many persons may be anxious to be inpersons may be anxious to be in-formed what particular part of the Constitution authorizes either Con-gress or the Supreme Court to abol-iah or prohibit polygamy. We have scanned it carefully and have atter-ly failed to find in that embodi-ment of our government any pro-vision whatever in regard to polykindred crimes, that "the enforcement of the law of 1862, would imprison our husbands, despoil and destroy our homes, crush our most sincere affections, render our children illegitimate before the world, and leave ourselves and thousands vision whatever in regard to poly-gamy or any other system of the of women desolate and unprotect-ed;" that "this example set by the United States would encourage gamy or any other system of the marital relation between man and wife. We have not seen the opin-ion of the court, which no doubt contains at least a pretence to jus-tify its decision; but no matter what the pretence is, it must be founded in prejudice, political dem-agogueism, or that obedience which men in power yield to popular pre-judice whether right or wreng.
