

Manager Harry Joseph and P. J. Donohue, the well known mining engineer, raturned last night from a trip to the Silver Shield mine in Bingham which has been showing up lately with ome good ore. Mr. Donohue has concluded, after a Mr. Donohue has concluded, after a thorough examination of the property, that the lower tunnel has encountered what is known in the United States company's ground as the Highland bedded vein and not the Silver Shield vein, as was first supposed. It was explained today that when the tunnel had reached a point about 50 feet back from its present face, a stringer 'of ore was cut. This fissure came in at an angle and it was decided to change the course of the tunnel so as to intercept it further ahead, which has been done. Assays made in camp show the ore to contain values of 22 per cent lead, 7.13 ounces sliver and \$3 gold to the ton. The management is devoting atten-tion to the exploration of this vein and at the same time the work in the tunnel will be continued in the direction of the Silver Shield vein, which, it is figured, will be tapped in another 50
