Iosepa, Tocele Co., Aug. 28.—At 3 o'clock this morning the people here were awakened by the harmonious blending of the tuneful volces of a Hawallan quartet, commemorating the day 16 years ago when a little band of them, under the leadership of W. W. Cluff of Coalville, and others, came to the Rich ranch and made Iosepa. There are now some 15 families, num-bering about 70 souls, aged from 70 years to 7 days. Bell phone 154Y. Independent 19

At 7 o'clock this morning two dress-ed pigs, weighing over 100 pounds each, were placed whole in a pit, where a fire, hours old, had heated some stones in the bottom to an intense heat. Be-tween the stones and the pigs were stocks and leaves of corn. The whole was covered with mats leaving only a small hole in the top of a pyramid thus formed. Through this hole water was indiciously moured and coming in was judiciously poured and coming in contact with the rocks, produced a steam which was confined closely until 12 o'clock noon, when a most delicious 12 octors moon, when a most delicious quarry of julcy, white meat was un-covered, torn apart with the hands and served to nearly 100 people, seated at tables prepared in a bowery of green willows and carpeted with lucern. Bowls of flour pol, emptied from barrels of it, were placed along the center of the tables where parties of four or five dioned sociable and en-

center of the tables where parties of four or five dipped sociably and en-thusiastically from the same dish. Many kinds of ries, loads of delicious cake and rice pudding, plates of peach-es and platters of grapes, raised in the gardens of the Hawaiians here, were piled artistically and temptingly upon the tables and served with the roast up and not in one course which lasted

pig and pol in one course which lasted nearly an hour. And then the Bishop of the colony greeted the people and congratulated them on their pleasant surroundings.

Farrell for the governing board of the company owning the land, reof the company owning the land, re-sponded, quartets and solos were sung, ploncer Iosepians toasted until 4 o'clock, when the married Hawalians took a ball game away from the sin-gle Hawalians, with a score of 16 to 12. At 5 o'clock a dance commenced in the amusement hall of the colony, and the fun was furious until 12 o'clock, midnicht.

midnight. The colony is getting more prosperous each year. From between 500 and 700

each year. From between 500 and 700 acres of land they have raised about 500 tons of hay, 1,200 bushels of wheat, 500 bushels of barley, some corn, po-tatoes and other vegetables. The hay stacks, the grain stacks and the yards are such as would excite the envy of any farmer anywhere. The houses of these people are furnished, some rudely, but plentifully, others with such generosity and taste as emu-late the homes of the well-to-do Amer-ican. Planos, violins, guitars and other musical instruments are in full evidence, and evince the love of the Hawailan for music. Some have well Hawailan for music. Some have well kept lawns; all have orchards and fine shade trees. Some own their own horses and cows, buggles and harness. There are no poor among them.
