TELE-PHOTOGRAPHY: ITS USE IN WAR.

In an exhibition of the Royal Photos graphic society held in London there was shown a wenderful photograph of Most Blanc which had been taken by M. Fred Boissonnas, of Geneva. The peculiarity of the picture was that the photographer was nearly fifty miles away when he exposed his plate; yet the details in the photograph of houses, trees, glaciers, snow, fields and crops, were nothing short of marvelous. How was the result obtained? the

By the aid of the "tele-photographic lens," which is to the camera what the

telescope is to the eye:

It may be interesting here to mention
that the tele-photo lens is playing an
important part in the Transvaal war. Most of the war correspondents carry ameras a large number of officers have photographic outfits with them, and the balloon corps of the royal engi-neers employ photography for obtainng views of the enemy's camps and fortifications. Tele-photography from a balloon has

been often attempted with very cessful results, especially in the Italian Thus, by its use, officers of the Italian engineers have been able to discover in the Alps French batteries which had before been unknown to them, and to

ment specially designed for the purpose of balloon photography.

The pictures, which give excellent detail, were taken at heights of 500, 800. and 900 metres, those which depict en-campments and forts are of striking inerest and exceedingly valuable from a

nilltary point of view. The tele-photo lens was used for the irst time in actual warfare during the lepartment of the Japanese govern ment. The lens gave most remarkable results on this occasion,-Pearson's Magazine for May.
