Elder Cazier left here December 5th, 882, and was appointed to labor in Alabama, where he operated three months as Traveling Elder, and the remainder of the time as President of the Conference. That field is comparatively quiet, there being little or no opposition at present, and but little inquiry regarding the Gospel. About 40 persons have been added during the last eight months, however. Some time since some of the Elders in

that field were mobbed, Elders Israelson, Boyce and Shumway having been fired at in and driven out of Marion County, but escaped unhurt. There are no Elders in that particular locality now, as the populace threaten to kill any of the brethren who might appear among them. Elder Cazier had a good time, generally speaking, and excellent health. He baptized 15 persons, and assisted in administering that ordi-

nance to the same number. Elder Morrell left home February 26, 1883. He labored in South Mississippi all the time of his mission. He met \$1. with almost incessant opposition and persecution, with brief intervals between the assaults. He is the Elder who was selzed by a mob last July, taken out of bed by them and whipped severely, as reported in the NEWS shortly after the occurrence. He bap-
