ing forms to this new soll-which con-tains the elements necessary for plant growth except phosphorus and nitrogen -has been engerly watched. Within three years Dr. Treub of Java found that various plants had already begun to grow, those of the interior being quite different from those near the coast, while ferns were remarkably pre-ponderant, and slimy, blue-green algae were specially active in preparing the soll for higher organisms. Another sci-entific visit was made in 1897, and the progress of the new flora up to 1906 has been lately reported by Prof. D. H. Campbell. The progress of the forest trees has been particularly rapid, and it is evident that the island will soon be covered with a juxuriant forest—an ob-

is evident that the Island will soon be covered with a luxuriant forest—an ob-ject lesson in the production of new forests under fatorable tropical condi-tions. The nitrogen for vegetation has been collected in the soil by bacteria. The first plants to arrive—bagteria.blue-green algae, ferns and mosses—were brought by the wind, as were also the first grasses and flowering plants, but seeds and fruits seem to have been chiefly introduced by ocean currents.

The face of the country in Europe has been materially altered by human effort. Of the tillable land of Holland 90 per cent has been wrested from the sea, and in Great Britain a work acarcely less has been done, for a third of the present land is said to have been bogs and marshes in the time of King Alfred. In the United States, where the work of reclaiming is just beginning, it is estimated that drain-age will add 200,000 square miles to the farm land.

The farm hand, An attempt to locate the distance mense of the blind has been made by Dr. Woelfflin, a German investigator, who finds from his own and other ex-periments that this sense is probably a function of the sensory fibers of the first of the three branches of the tri-facial nerve of trigeninus. This nerve, ramifying through the face, has been of a nerve of motion, of common sen-sation, and of the special sense of taste. It has been long known that some persons among the blind can move about with remarkable certainty without coming into contact with any inge object, and haif a century ag-spellanzani showed that bats fly about confidentily and safely in darkness and even when blind. The idea that re-flected sound waves act as a guids through the hearing hus been dis-proved by stopping the ears of a blind man, when the distance sense remain-ed, although diminished. In the fore-blind persons who have the sense it guints in greatly varying degree, and tomewhat resembles a light touch.

A new safety lamp for mines has the lamp bulb enclosed in a large A new safety lamp for mines has the lamp bulb enclosed in a large air-tight giase globe, and the heat of the light expands the enclosed air, cre-ating considerable pressure. If the bulb is broken in any accident, the compressed air rushes in, and extin-guishes and cools the incandescent fila-ment before the explosive air of the mine can reach it. A single-cell stor-age battery, enclosed in a celluloid case, supplies current for 12 hours on a single charge, yielding a light of between one and two canddepower.
