GRAND ARMY BILL PASSES IN HOUSE

Senate Measure Appropriating \$35,000 for Entertainment of Veterans Adopted.

PASS BADGER'S ELECTION ACT

Method Adopted by "American" Party Can No Longer Prevail—Four New Bills Offered.

After considerable debate, the house yesterday passed S. B. 73, the measure appropriating \$35,000 for the entertainment at Salt Lake City next August of the G. A. R. encampment. There was some objection to the amount of money authorized by the bill, Representative Morris of Washington says he thought \$20,000 was sufficient, and Representative Thompson stating his view that \$25,000 should be enough, considering the number of other appropriations the house would be called upon to supply.

Representative Bower of Utah thought the state could not afford to be generous in the matter of entertaining the remnants of the men who fought to save the Union. Representative J. N. Davis of Utah favored the original amount, and said he would be willing to forego the building of a bridge across the Green at Utah for a year or two rather than fail in showing due honor and respect to the sacred veterans.

Representative Cannon of Salt Lake said he would rather see the appropriation made \$30,000 than a sum named in the bill. The measure finally passed with but one dissenting vote, that of Representative Morris, and he changed his vote to aye.

House bill No. 142, which passed by Ashton, was recommended for passage by the committee on finance. The bill provides that the county commissioners and city council of Salt Lake be empowered to make such appropriations as may be necessary to entertain the G. A. R. next summer.

ELECTION TICKETS. The house passed senate bills 22, 23 and 24, by Badger, which measures firmly place a quietus on such tactics as those adopted by the "American" party at the polls last fall, in placing the names of their candidates on several tickets under different headings.

The bills are of a similar nature and provide explicitly against the use of the same names on any two tickets under different party emblems. Senate bill No. 22 provides that candidates for public office may be nominated other than by committees or caucuses, namely by the filing of certificates of nomination signed by 500 taxpayers in the case of state offices, 100 in county offices and 50 or more in city, town or village offices.

House bill No. 46, by Henric, one of the good reform measures, which authorizes the use of the services of convicts upon the public roads, was passed. The bill authorizes the payment of \$1.50 per day to each convict for his work, the amount to be credited to him, on his account in the prison, and the balance over their "keep cost" to be paid them at the expiration of the sentence. The bill passed unanimously.

House bill No. 154, by Russell, protecting trademarks and trade names within the state, was passed by the house by a vote of 36 to 1.

The only material change from the present law relating to trademarks is the introduction of penalty for the fraudulent use or imitation of these on the part of persons other than their owners. After some little discussion, the bill was so amended as to include not only the goods, marks, emblems and unions, but protects the trademark whether adopted by the owner in this state or somewhere else.

FOUR NEW BILLS. Among the bills introduced yesterday was H. B. 209, by Wootton, providing for the creation of an emergency where life or property might be in danger, eight hours will be the limit of a working day in mines, smelters and factories, including sugar factories. The new law amends section 1337, Compiled Laws of Utah, 1907, and expressly states that the period of employment in all underground mines or workings and in all institutions for the reduction or refining of metals and in sugar factories shall be eight hours and no more. A penalty is provided making it a misdemeanor for a violation of the terms of the measure.

H. B. 208, by McKee, provides that the laws of the county state or municipality within the State of Utah, and all church property, ditches, canals and pumping plants, whether owned by individuals or by corporations, shall be exempt from taxation.
