LIGHT BALLOT ON SCHOOL BONDS

Meager Corporal's Guard Turns Out and Votes on \$250,000 Proposition.

MAJORITY FAVORS ISSUE.

Board Will Meet Tomorrow Night to Consider What Shall be Done With Money.

In a very light ballot, the proposition to Issue \$250,000 in school bonds to build. new school houses, was passed at Saturday's special election. There were only 277 favorable votes cast, giving a majority of 115 for the bonds, with 266 votes cast against them.

The principal feature about the vote is the fact that it is so light. One of the great arguments of government methods is thus brought into the limelight, as those who shout for the referendum and popular vote on important questions are constantly opposed by those why cry that the people do not take time to investigate and come out to vote, after once putting the business of running the government on the shoulders of paid office holders. In this case it would appear that nearly all the people had forgotten, as the normal vote in any one precinct should have been about three times the total vote cast in the entire city. More people have gathered around a bulletin board to read the returns by rounds of some carnival of fisticuffs, than Saturday took the trouble to vote about the

In the first precinct, where more school children reside than in any other precinct, the majority was against the issue, but this district is also the least

Tuesday evening the board of education will meet to consider what shall be done with the money, and exactly the board members favor large schools houses it is planned to build. Most of the board members favor large shools of from 18 to 24 rooms, instead of the 10 or 12 room structures that are frequently creeted where there is not money enough to put up the larger structures.
