TALK OF THE TOWN.

A \$3,000 race is on the tap. The first looked forth last night. The High Council meets to-night at 7:30. The fire in the Oquirrh Mountains is subdued. Nine cases were tried in the police court today. Sewerage for Salt Lake is being extensively mooted. A number of District Schools started up today. The railroad magnates left the Territory on Saturday. The Careless Concert is the great theatrical attraction this evening. The death rate is decreasing, and none too soon for the community. Arthur Peck, the injured C. P. R. brakeman, is progressing finely. The Relief Societies of Weber Stake hold a conference on Thursday. A brutal husband was arrested Saturday evening, for beating his wife. The Bishopric of the 8th Ward assisted in dispensing the Sacrament yesterday. Jack Frost has been tacking the tour of Cache Valley, says the Leader. The Home Dramatic Club will open their fall and winter season on the 17th inst. Charlotte Thompson opens a theatrical engagement of three nights on Thursday next. President George Q. Cannon and Elder George Goddard returned from Grandville last night. Mr. Bierstadt, the artist, is enchanted with Utah scenery, particularly with the Cottonwood lakes. The Ogden Depot question has been settled. Permanent structures will be built as expeditiously as possible. Al. Barker, formerly a base ballist, threw a 150 ft. hammer 71 feet, at Black Rock last week, and won the prize. Work is plentiful on the Utah and Northern, at \$1.75 or \$2.00 per day. It is also plentiful right here at home. As surmised, the conflagration in the west mountains on Saturday, was among the brush and timber of that region. The question of the further progress of the U. S. N. R. R. towards Butte City, will be settled by arbitration—may be. William Fugh, a youth of 18 years, had three fingers of his left hand severed, at Gilson's Planing Mill, in Ogden on Saturday. Gen. Phil Sheridan and party, who have been on a trip to the Yellowstone, passed through Ogden on Saturday going east. James Murray, a U. P. R. R. fireman, had his right foot cut off on Saturday, at Utah. He was in the act of boarding a moving freight train. Five prisoners escaped from the county jail yesterday, about 5 p.m. One of them named Richardson has given himself up, the others are still at large. James Phillips, a well known salesman, formerly of this city, died at Oakland, California, on the 29th ult., and was buried on the following day. Fred O. Hilt, Wells, Fargo & Co.'s messenger between Wintergreen and Idaho, was shot dead last Thursday, in Boise City, by a man named Burdell. A mass meeting of the Salutes of the 7th Ward called to convene at the Ward Assembly room on Thursday at 7:30 p. m., to consider the propriety of finishing the house. Arthur Stagner, Jr., has returned from Murfreesville, Tenn., where he has been studying the sugar-making process. Himself and father are about to start a sugar manufactory at Farmington.

Surprise Presentation.

Thursday evening, the members of the Sunday School and many other residents of the 14th Ward, met with the Bishop and his Counselors in their commodious school-room for the purpose of attending, as was supposed, a rehearsal of the Sunday School choir. The real object was to tender to Bishop J. W. Philpott and his Counselors, a surprise presentation of the Theological class of respect on the occasion of their change in office. Bro. Philpott has for a long time shyly filled the position of Superintendent of the Sunday School, but has since been called to act as Counselor to Bishop Keeler. Bro. Gillespie has successfully presided over the Theological class for several years, and is now called to succeed Brother Philpott as Superintendent. After singing and prayer, Brother Jno. Vincent presented to Brother Philpott, in behalf of the officers, teachers and members of the Sunday School, a finely illustrated first Bible, a Book of Mormon, and a Book of Doctrine and Covenants. Bro. Jno. Summerhays, in behalf of the theological class, presented Bro. Gillespie with an excellent and beautifully framed testimonial, signed in autograph by the Bishop and all the present and former students of the theological class. The event was quite a surprise to the brethren and both expressed their gratitude in words full of sentiment and good counsel. After other speeches and some nicely rendered singing, the assembly dispersed.

Fair Matters.

The Board of Directors of the D. A. and M. Society, at their meeting on Saturday night, decided upon the following regulations for the coming Territorial Fair. The Fair will be opened to the public at noon Monday, October 23, 1891. All exhibits, except live stock and flowers, should be on the Fair grounds by 10 o'clock p.m., Saturday, Oct. 21. The society will retain 25 per cent. on all premiums paid to competitors by the society. Rules and regulations to be observed by competitors for the special premium of fifty dollars offered by George A. Moore, for the best essay on "Utah, her Resources and Attractions." Each essay entered for competition must be forwarded to the Board of Directors of the D. A. and M. Society on or before the 1st day of October next. Two initials will be selected and used by each contestant, so that the real name may not be known to the awarding committee until after the award is made, and that unsuccessful contestants need not be known to the public unless so desired by them. In the event of a special awarding committee, the board will select gentlemen of known ability in the several branches most likely to be presented by competitors. F. A. Armstrong, Esq., was appointed to see the superintendents of the several railroads to secure special rates for exhibits and exhibitors.

A Handsome Safe.

A handsome safe, a mammoth safe, manufactured by the Hall Safe and Lock Company, of Cincinnati and St. Louis, arrived on Saturday from Chicago, and was put in place at the President's office today. It is 6 feet 8 inches in height, 5 feet in width, 3 feet 3 inches in thickness, and weighs 7,200 pounds. It has massive double doors, beautifully ornamented, and secured by the patent combination lock. In order to put it in position, in the clerk's department of the office, it was found necessary to remove the front door and a portion of the frame, and the ceiling fixtures and the iron railing on the east side of the room. The ornamentation on the safe doors consists of the firm name of the manufacturers, some nicely executed Japanese work, and the emblematic beehive of Deseret. The safe was brought from the depot this morning, under the direction of Supt. O. P. Arnold. It is one of the largest and handsomest in the Territory.

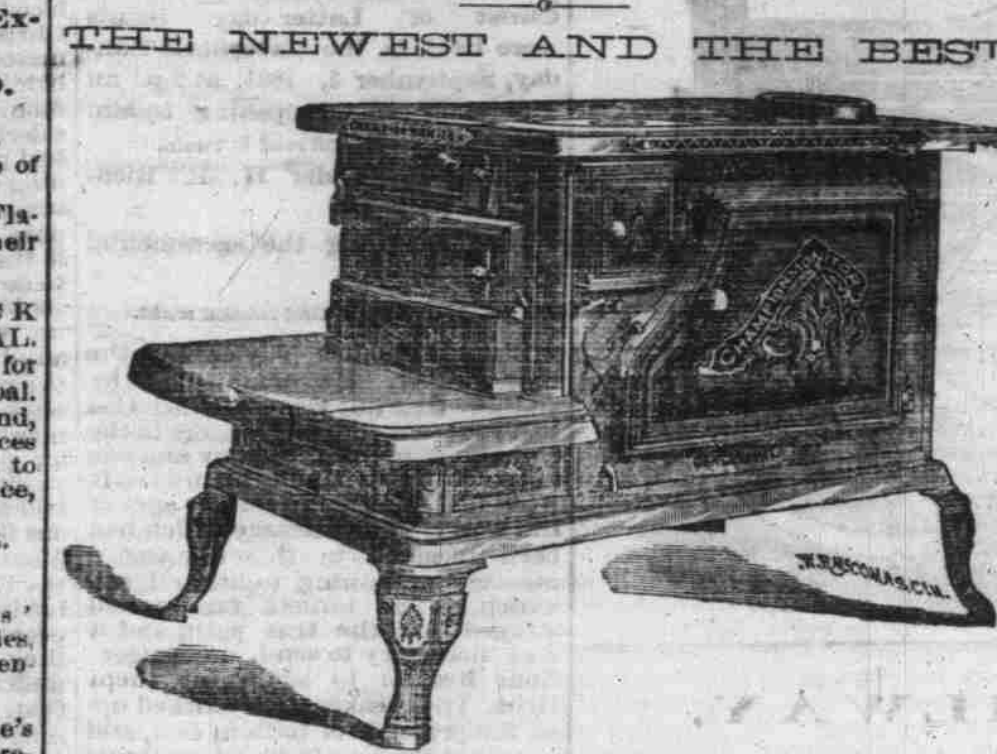
