As has been reported to you on former occasions, we are suffering a constant detriment from the fact that students apply for admission who are entirely unqualified, through lack of training in elementary branches, to pursue the lowest studies of this department. Of necessity, the passing of test examinations has been made a requisite for entrance, and upward of 50 have been denied admittance during the present school year through their inability to enter the intermediate classes. It is to be sincerely hoped that institutions for preparatory stuly, under the Church school system, will be established at an early day within this city.

in accordance with the antiouncements through the annual circular studies of this department have been arranged in courses, with reference to the fluid graduation of the stu-Six such courses have been provided, viz.: Physical Science, Natural Science, Mathematics, Business Courses, Literature and History, and Phonography.

Three students have completed with success the Business Courses, and one, the courses in Literature and History, and these have this day received their certificates with varying degrees of efficiency. The other course, in which no graduates at present appear, have not been without their ardent devoters; but many of these lines of study are long and arduous, and great time is required for the completion of the courses. The Principal has deemed it advisable to recommend to students great caution in making their applications for final examination, lest they in some degree imbibe the idea that has proved itself so de structive to true progress in scholastic pursuits-the belief that the se curing of documentary evidence of efficiency is itself a guarantee of knowledge.

THE THEOLOGICAL EXERCISES

have been conducted during the term with no essential variation from the methods previously re-Daily sessions of the theological classes have been held, the exercises of which comprised lectures by the instructors, and the study of assigned lessons in the standard works of the Church, and the answering of incidental questions upon subjects of general inter-Testimony meetings have been hel I in each department at intervals of two weeks, and students have given ample proof of their sincere interest in the exercises. The monthly fast-day has been regularly observed by appropriate exercises, which on that day have taken the place of the recitation in theology. The hi-weekly Priesthood meeting an I the weekly general theological class have continued as heretofore, with increasing interest. priate devotional exercises comprising singing and prayer have been conducted at the opening and closing of each day's session.

We have been specially favored during the term with valuable in-structions from Elder George Rey-nolds, who has conducted the noing, who has conducted the academic class in Book of Mormon study, twice per week. The gentleman's ability as an expounder of the Book of Mormon, which is so well known and acknowledged amo so generally among our people, has been willingly and liberally applied to the as-sistance of our students in this important part of their theological study. Our earnest thanks are due Elder Reynolds for his efficient aid.

According to their Church standing, the students have been recorded as follows:

High Priests, 1; Seventies, 2; Elders, 12; Priests, 8; Teachers, 9; Doacons, 60; total bearing Priest-hood, 92; lay-members, 139; non-members, 2; general total, 233. Our thanks are due the officers

and members of the choir, who have added so much to the fervor of the devotional execises. win Cutler has acted as choir-leader, and Brother Clare W. Reid as organist, to our full satisfaction.

THE LADY STUDENTS

have continued in the labors of the Ladies' Class under the careful directiou of our Lady Superintendent, Mrs. Camilla Cobb. he class has met in two sections, arranged has met in two sections, according to the ages of the members. Section A comprised 87 ladies and has held during the term. 21 sessions. Dr. Mattie R. Hughes rendered very valuable assistance to the organization by delivering a series of six lectures upou the subject "Personal Hygiene for Women." Class B consisted of members, all under the age of fif-teen. Of this division 16 sessions have been held during the term.

THE STUDENTS' SOCIETY

has been conducted under the presidency of Instructor Done, with Miss Anna Erickson associated as secretary. Evening meetings have been held at the close of each week with but few omissions. There have been, since the opening of the term, fourteen such meetings, at which nine lectures have been delivered and five varied programmes of literary and musical exercises have been rendered. Beside the members of the faculty and many prominent students, the following have favored the society with lectures upon special topica:

Bishop O. F. Whitney, one lecture; Dr. B. B. Pratt, one; Elder John Nicholson, one; Don C. Young, C. E., two; Elder F. F. Hibtze, one; Hon. F. S. Richards, one; and Elder B. H. Roberts, one.

THE CLASS WORK

has been carried on after the usual plan. The programme of exercises and the class records showing the standing of each student are before Written reviews have been held at regular intervals, and final examinations in all classes were conducted shortly before the close of the term.

The records kept, the apparatus owned and used by the institution and the library, call for no special report additional to that made to you at the close of the preceding

term.

THE BUILDINGS

present occupied by the college afford but very inadequate accom-modations for the departments of the institution. We feel that as far as the number of classes and the grades of study are concerned we have practically reached the limit of our growth until more ample facilities are provided. If additional room cannot be secured for the coming year the advisability of dispensing with the lower divisions of the Intermediate Department should be considered.
