A mob was immediately formed, but the sheriff, hearing that violence would be at-tempted, had Browder taken into the woods for the night and when the mob made its appearace succeeded in con-vincing it that the negro was not in the jail. The band dispersed and the next morning Browder was taken to Bowling Green, and later to Louis-ville. ville

The meeting of the hegro lodge and its endorsement of Browder's deed oc-curred immediately afterward. The tree from which the negroes were hanged has been used for the same purpose before.
