MAJ. EAGAN TO BE COURT MARTIALED

Surgeon at Fort Dougles Star Attraction in a Sensation,

BRUTALITY IS ALLEGED,

said That Sick Soldiers Have Been Used Boughly and Sought Civilian Medical Treatment.

Major Peter R. Egen at Fort Douglas will be tried by court martial next Thursday, on charge of neglect and abuse of patients. For some time there have been complaints from enlisted men that they have been abused and subjected to indignities when applying at the post hospital for treatment. It is alleged that one soldier, some time ago was so roughly received by the surgeon that he went down town and remained under treatment of city physicians at an expense of \$35, which sum. it is alleged, the surgeon was obliged to refund by Captain Schley, then in to refund by Capital Benergy, then in command of the post. And in general, there has been continued complaint about the brutality of this surgeon. Ma-jor Young, of the Eighteenth infantry, who has the best interest of his men who has the best interest of his men at heart, has been investigating, and recently filed charges at headquarters at Denver with the department command-er, charging Major Egan with violation of the articles of war. Major Moseley, chief surgeon of the department was sent out here to make a searching in-menterion of the medical situation at vestigation of the medical situation at the post, and another surgeon from headquarters has been out since. The headquarters has been out since. The result of their visit was the approval by the department commander, Col. Sanno of the Eighteenth Infantry, of the charges made by Major Young, and now comes the order for the court mar-tial. Major Egan is not under arrest, as army surgeons are exempt from ar-est will the day of the sitting of the as army surgeons are exempt from ar-rest until the day of the sitting of the court martial. Both Major Young and the surgeon refuse to talk in/advance of the court martial, but the enlisted men are having considerable to say and are rather in high feather. Egan came to this post from Forto Rico about fourteen months ago. He is a native of Ireland and was appointed to the army in May 23, 1882. He was pro-moted to a captaincy in 1887, and in 1988 was made a major and brigade mated to a captainty in 1887, and in 1898 was made a major and brigade surgeon in the volunteer service. Boas, local agent of the Hamburg-American Steamship line, is in Germany confer-ring with the high officials of the company concerning the operation of the eccan line in conjunction with an American railroad, says the Tribune. Mr. Boas went abroad a few weeks ago, and it was then said that Ameriago, and it was then said that Ameri-can capitalists through "dummies" in Vienna were seeking to get control of the German steamship company and that Mr. Boas had been hurriedly called to the main office at Hamburg to ex-plain, if possible, what the combination of the Atlantic Transport and Leyland lines really meant. ines really meant. It is said in shipping circles that it would be impossible for Americans to secure control of the Hamburg-Ameri-can line, the capitalization of which is about \$50,000,000, and that Mr. Boas' mission abroad

mission abroad was to lay before the Hamburg-American company plans and arrangements for a deal with the Atchi-son, Tepeka and Santa Fe railroad. It was announced some time ago that negotiations were in progress looking to the establishment by the Hamburg-Amadom, Steamahin commany of a line to the establishment by the Hamburg-American Steamship company of a line on the Pacific to be operated in con-rection with the Atchison road, but those negotiations yielded no result. The report now is that the Pennsyl-vania railroad, which has close rela-tions with the International Navigation company operating the American and Red Star steamship companies is to be associated with the Atchison in any arrangement which may be made with arrangement which may be made with the Hamburg-American line, thus form-ing a through route from Europe to the Orient by way of the United States.
