The final apportionment of the school funds collected during 1907 for the schools of Salt Lake county was completed yesterday by County Auditor Frank Higenbotham. The total for the year is \$155,589.60, which is equal to \$5,38 per capita of the school normal capita of the school popula-he county. The first apportion. tion of the county. nent was made in January, when the sum of \$135,056.40 was distributed. The apportionment made Monday amounted to \$20.539.20
