## THE CORNISH ISSUE.

THE ANARCHIST SPECIAL DISPATCH FROM  
WASHINGTON, published in the  
Chicago Tribune under date of July 12.

"One's dead for Washington, but there are Republican Senators who seem bound to help him. The other day in the Committee on Territories, Senator C. L. Smith, of the Democratic members, introduced a bill favoring the admission of the Missouri Territory, so that it will be admitted with a majority report."

"Smith's position is plain. He wants Utah admitted as a State so that the safety of the Union may be secured by the pocket, through it and Nevada and putting it in a position where it will come. Senator Greeley's motion, however, seems to call for expansion. Some weeks ago, while the Democratic members under a majority of the rules passed a bill calling for Arizona and New Mexico, a strong vote from the members who cried out 'Auld Lang Syne' they wanted it to the polygamous territory.

"But Greeley's bill would not give them a chance, and refused to recognize any attempt to make the motion to suspend the rules, so that no action could be taken. It would be queer if Greeley's Senate should have less regard for public decency than Democratic House."

It is copied by the Tribune of the city, with comments containing a characteristic ring at Senator Clegg, and the opinion that all the other Senators of the surrounding states favor the proposed movement. However, it does not seem that "a full understanding with the Mormon Church" as it goes that goes with it. But it manifests a gloomy and somewhat foreboding conviction that its efforts to prevent liberty for Utah will be abortive.

"We refer to the notice that the Legislature may understand that with the election of Mr. Cheever, standard will be given in Utah within a year, or even before, to the election in the fall of 1863. It is quite possible it will be the same with the reelection of Mr. Harris, whom it takes a strong man as President to return on a local question the endorsement of his party senators in all the adjacent States."

This being the case, why should not the decent men among the "Liberals" fall in with the march of events, catch the spirit of the times, get out of their old and useless rut, and take part in the work that will soon be upon the people of this Territory? The "Liberal" organ says further:

"We firmly contend that the Republicans Senators in all the surrounding states to Utah have an understanding which means standard for Utah in the near future."

If that is the case, what is the use of fighting the movement and keeping up a struggle over dead issues? The miserable nonsense which the Tribune editor poured out before the summer

of Minneapolis, and which O. W. Powers and the crew repeated at Chicago, is behind the times. It did very well for Tribune purposes to play up the old fight to stings and stale for the present. As the Mormon organ says, "Gloomy about

"Mormon" destruction of the future State are to be studied dummie." "Liberal" sees that only exotic ridicule is due. What is the use of playing with them any longer? Nobody who has sense and inclination believes that there will be any other dangers in Utah than those which the respective national parties always picture as the consequences of the triumph of the opposition.

It is of no use to be about the "Mormons" any longer. It is long past to keep up the false alarm about "Church rule" any more. Why not stop this folly and make a genuine and sincere effort to secure the coming State to that political party which each citizen believes to be the best?

The old issues are gone; the old strife should cease. Let us have Republican principles and Democratic doctrines in dispute, instead of religious beliefs against irreligious enthusiasts and sharp retaliation against malicious misrepresentations and rigid institutions. Each party thinks its own success essential to the welfare of the community. Let each seek in an honest way, to gain control of the coming State.

Those who linger and try to keep up the old conflict will find themselves left behind and counted as base traitors. A new epoch is approaching for Utah. Leaving the things that we held, let us press onward to those that are better, and help to mould them for the last interests of the coming commonwealth.

## INDIVIDUAL, STATE AND FEDERAL RIGHTS.

The labor troubles in Idaho bring up a serious question. They also demonstrate a political principle. The question is, how far may labor combine without becoming destructive of true liberty? The principle is, that the Federal power cannot be exerted, whether under a Republican or a Democratic administration, in any state or nation. Unto the suppression of domestic violence, until the Congress or the Legislature of that state call for Federal aid and declare the state unable to settle and quiet its own internal difficulties.

The news from the north, contained in our morning dispatches, tell of a bloody conflict between the union and secessionist parties at Cedar City. It looks as though the actual fighting was begun by the secessionists. But whether that was so or not, it is a fact that the union men have suffered in recent days from fighting which was not being done by their side. They have given up to the other side their right to evidence. That makes one of the main difficulties in doing the battle when men should be employed to do the work.

With the dispute between the employer and the employee, we have nothing to do. The union men may be fully justified in refusing to work or not. We might consider their right to quit if they choose, to demand such wages as they thought they ought to have, and to organize a society for the maintenance of their wages and claims. But we do not think they have the right to prevent other men from working at prices they please, or to injure the property or persons of employers or employees.

One of the worst forms of tyranny is that which seeks by force to prevent workpeople from accepting labor at prices that suit themselves, or because they do not choose to join an other society or union. It is a tyranny which will have to be met and put down. If men will not rise reasonably and revolt in their communities against capital, then must we be at the bottom of the heap, and the law of God and the Constitution will be violated.
