INSPECTOR DISCHARGED Incompetent Political Appointee Basely Deserted by Those Who Got Him a Job.

The board of public works, at a meeting held yesterday afternoon, peremptorily discharged Paul Dockendorf, who had been acting as a sewer inspector, Complaint had been made by the city engineer that Dockendorf had permitted half a block of sewer pipes to be laid wrong end to, and the dismissal followed. It was private work that was being done by the Utah Light & Railway company, on the block com-Railway company, on the block occu-pled by its car barns, but was sub-

pied by its car barns, but was sub-ject to city inspection. Dockendorf and the contractors had not followed his instructions, but it was evident that the mistake was entirel" due either to his carelessness or ignor-ance. Many of the inspectors employed by the city are said to be men of no experience in the line of work in hand. experience in the line of work is hand. They are given positions because of political reasons, and much of the work "inspected" by them has to be done over again. The city engineer has tried to have only competent men for such work, but so far attempts in that direction have been unavailing.
