SLAUGHTER HOUSES OLD AND NEW.

There was nothing thrown away about the old-fashioned slaughterhouses. A diseased liver, if not too bad, would have the ulcer cut out and be loaded on the wagon for delivery to some of the smaller markets where meat was sold cheaply, says W. H. Brainerd in Leslie's Weekly. The ref-use from the slaughter of beeves and sheep was fed to hogs which were be-ing held for killing. They would suck up the warm blood of a bullock just killed as though it were so much milk. These slaughterhouses which are here indicated were remote from a stream of water, and their cleansing consisted of washing the floor by dashing pails of water over it, and washing the refuse into the hog-troughs. These slaughterhouses threw off a stench that could be detected for a mile away. Luckly the houses were clustered in an area of perhaps half a mile in cirbad, would have the ulcer cut out and Luckily the houses were clustered in an area of perhaps half a mile in cir-cumference. This recital recalls a siaugiterhouse in a village of about 800. It was beside a stream of good proportions, but it could not be kept clean, and offended the olfactory or-gans of every one who passed. It was impossible to keep it sweet, for the rea-son that its construction was not of such a nature that it could be thor-oughly cleansed, and because there was no water pressure. This might have been obtained by running a small conduit 200 feet, but 200 feet of con-duit, though only iron pipe, would have cost money.

cost money. If local slaughterhouses were to be re-established, would they be built on any better plans than heretofore? A slaughterhouse is an undesirable neigh-bor in any locality, and those who conduct them, if the past is any cri-terion, are averse to spending much money in their construction. Pack-ingtown, now that she has been taken under the shed and suffered the birch and lecture, will fulfill the country's requirements much better and more satisfactorily than the local slaughtercost money satisfactorily than the local slaughterhouses.
