**LOCAL BRIEFS.**

Roland Bower, quartermaster sergeant of the Twenty-ninth infantry, has been ordered from Fort Douglas to Washington Barracks, D. C.

Gottfried Teuscher has bought for \$500 50x132 feet on First South street between Ninth and Tenth West, where he will build a six-room brick cottage.

The State Historical society will hold its annual meeting and election of officers tomorrow afternoon, in the director's room of the Deseret National bank.

The Journeyman Tailor's union, No. 111, has elected S. A. Lind as delegate to the national convention of the society, which will be held at Bloomington, Illinois, Feb. 6.

J. W. Heuston has sold his Main street block, between Second and Third South street, to Mrs. Mary Judge for \$40,000. The size of the property is 46x330 feet, and the site is sure to increase in value, with time.

A copy of the articles of incorporation of the Logan Glove and Tanning company of Logan, has been filed in the secretary of state's office. Its capital stock is \$10,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$10 each.

The Cooks and Waiters' union will give a ball at Federation hall Wednesday evening. The floor committee are N. C. Johnson, B. R. Burns and B. F. Meyer, and the reception committee is composed of A. R. Miller, Harry Turner and Joseph Brown.

The dramatic entertainment which was to be given at the Lafayette school on Friday next, has been postponed till Monday, Jan. 23, when the play, "Three Little Kittens" will be presented. There will be two performances, afternoon and evening.

Ben Hanson, charged with insanity occupies the padded cell at the county jail. He was brought down from Cache valley yesterday, and will be given a hearing in the district court this week. Hanson spends most of his time singing and laughing for an audience, but is in no wise violent.

The Woman's Relief Corps of McKean post, G. A. R., at a special meeting Saturday night, at the residence of Mrs. L. D. Dunn, 50 South Main Street, decided to present a formal protest to the United States senate against the seating of Senator Smoot. The vote on the proposition was 23 to 5.

E. E. Robbins, a veteran of the Civil war, died at his comfortable Indianapolis Saturday night, at the advanced age of 75 years. He was a native of Germany and so far as known has no relatives in this country. The local members of the G. A. R. took charge of the remains and conducted the funeral services.

Last night at a meeting of local 721 of the Bartender's International League an elegant ring was presented to President Joseph Lane. The presentation speech was made by Vice-President F. H. Stewart, and a response was spoken by the recipient. The ring bears the insignia of the order set in diamonds.

Clarence Henderson, aged 9, and Leslie Greeves, aged 11, are under arrest on the charge of petit larceny. It is alleged that the boys stole many articles from different stores of the city. They were arrested at their homes by Officer Sperry, and made a full confession. They said they took the things because they wanted them.

The committee appointed by the Federation of Labor to look after legislation in behalf of that organization will go to the Legislature the following measure to be enacted into law: "state initiative and referendum," "state plumbing law," "a law for the protection of wages and material on public works," and "boller inspection law."

Friends of H. N. (Nate) Whitney will be surprised to learn that he and his former wife Rosemary Glass Whitney, recently re-married in Portland, Mr. Whitney, who was formerly employed on the Herald and "News" in this city, and his wife were divorced some time since, and she went to New York to sing in opera, while he took a position on the Portland Telegram.

Albert Hatterton, recently of Sheffield, England, is in this city endeavoring to ascertain the whereabouts of his father William Hatterton, aged 54, who left the old country in May, 1893. He came to this city, and six months thereafter wrote home stating where he was, and sending \$20. After that nothing was heard of him and his family fears that he may have been lost. He has a wife and six children.

Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock the funeral services of J. O. Mitchell were held for the late Mrs. J. O. Mitchell, S. D. Evans. Among those in attendance were the manager and all employees of the Salt Lake Hardware company, who wished to show the esteem in which their late associate was held. The services were conducted by Rev. P. A. Simpkin of the Phillips Congregational church, and interment was in Mt. Olivet cemetery.

The funeral services of the late Mrs. Beulah Woodruff Beaufit, granddaughter of President Woodruff, were held in the Eighteenth ward chapel yesterday, Bishop Whitney presiding. The speakers were Bishop Whitney and Elder John Henry Smith, prayers being pronounced by Dr. Frank E. Smith and Henry P. Richards, and the Eighteenth ward choir furnishing the music. The interment took place in the city cemetery, the remains being deposited near those of her daughter, Mrs. E. Byrom, who died some years ago.

**JAPANESE GIRL  
WANTS TO STAY.**

Secures a Writ of Habeas Corpus And Will Have a Hearing On Saturday.

**STORY OF HOW SHE CAME HERE**

Was Smuggled Across the Boundary Into This Country--The Slave Trade Among Her Countrywomen.

Hana Takeda, the little Japanese girl who is being held for deportation, has applied for a writ of habeas corpus, and the request has been granted by Judge Marshall of the U. S. district court.

Hana will be given a hearing Saturday, Jan. 21, and she will be represented by the law firm of Twomey & Twomey, of which United States Commissioner Twomey is a member. The request sets forth that the girl came into the United States legally, and the immigration bureau which caused her arrest has no jurisdiction.

Hana Takeda was arrested in Victoria alley at the same time as Frank Sauria was taken into the toils on the charge of being a keeper of slaves, upon information furnished by D. S. Isaki and K. Sakamoto of the Imperial Japanese consulate then exhibiting in Salt Lake.

Hana is a beautiful little girl, apparently not over 15 years of age, and she has been in this country considerably less than a year. Of the slave traffic which brought her here, according to the belief of the immigration inspectors, D. S. Isaki explained that in Japan there is a regular organization of women to buy and sell in the several districts of Japan and ship them to America in charge of masters, each girl being valued at from \$200 to \$300. This clique of men do a thriving business and make considerable money on this traffic.

In investigating the case of Hana Takeda, the immigration inspectors gradually got from her the story that she had been approached while working in Japan, a man who claimed to be a doctor, and she made a fabulous amount of money in America.

He induced her to come with him, and finally she was shipped across the water to Victoria, B. C., someone besides herself paying her fare. From Victoria she was smuggled across the border, detained for a while in a coast town, and finally sent to Salt Lake to find lodgings in Victoria alley, with six or eight more of her kind.

His text was from Philippians 11, 13-15: "Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended; but this one thing I do, forgetting the things that are behind, and reaching forth unto those things that are before; I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus."

The speaker said: "We become so fixed in our habits of thought and conduct that we act almost unconsciously and we need something from without to jolt us off the track of our prejudices. This must be done at once; the soul must be, in reality, a child of God. The new life thus begun will find consummation in an eternal life."

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
