When the flowers all rise from one place and have no pedicels, but are sessile, this form of inflorescence is called a head, as the button bush or *Sparganium occidentalis*, the red and white composite, and many others. MARRIAGE LICENSES

TO MEET THE REQUIREMENTS of the newly-enacted Territorial law, providing for the issuance of marriage licenses by the clerk of the county in which the ceremony is to be performed, the following provisions are hereby made:

1. That marriage can be legally performed, where there has been no previous marriage, upon a supply of licenses of approved form, which may be obtained by any person at the expense of the fee to be paid by the parties themselves. The law also requires that the person performing the ceremony return to the clerk of the county, within thirty days after the date of the ceremony, a certificate of the marriage, a certificate of the date and place of the ceremony, and a certificate, enabling for either a civil officer or a minister of the gospel, to perform the same at this office in any quantity, and the Probate Clerks ought to keep some of them on hand for the use of the public, if they could.

2. That the clerk of the county should supply the person applying for a marriage license with a certificate also, to provide for the certificate of the person who is to perform the ceremony, if the person who is to perform the ceremony is not the clerk of the county.
