COPPER PLANT RAILROAD.

The Streets Upon Which Men Will Still Want to Build and Operate.

The franchise is asked for under the usual restrictions and the date part of it is as follows:

THE PROCEEDINGS.

MUNICIPAL LANDS.

Frank Morris represented that his hotel, hotel, restaurants and amusement houses would expire September 1st of the present year, that July 29th all of the places of business where he has been connected with him would remain suspended until September 1st. POWER LAND PROPOSITION.

The special committee appointed to consider the proposition of the city on the power line to the Jordan river reported as follows:

WATERWORKS EXTENSION.

NEWER EXTENSION.

Superintendent of Water Works handed in a statement to the city council on August 20th, in favor of the extension of Second East, between 4th and 4th South streets, at \$10,000, length of extension, 322 feet, estimated cost per foot, \$30 annual tax per acre, \$10 per foot, and Temple Street, between 4th and 5th South, at \$10,000, length of extension, 201 feet, estimated cost per foot linear foot, \$10. Committee on police.

SEWER CLAUSES.

City Engineer Domina submitted a communication from Assistant Engineer in relation to the superiority of the Moltke water system. Committee on police.

EXTENSION DEBATED.

The regular city notes that sewer extension, \$10,000, for the extension of Second East, between 4th and 4th South streets, to cover Fifth and Sixth, has been passed, and that a protest sufficient to defeat the bill has been removed. Filed.

AFTER THE STREET RAILROAD.

City Engineer Domina represented that the city had no right to pass the street railroad in that the city does not own the street, or own the right of way, in view of which he requested that authority be given the road of public works and the engineer to have all costs works completed at once by the contractor for other portions of the street.
