Much Interest Taken in the Organization for Protection of Dumb Animals.

Ogden, March 23.—A great deal of interest is being manifested in the organization of the local branch of the State Humane society, as was indicated last evening by the increased attendance over the previous meeting, and every indication is that the association is going to be a thorough success. Not alone are people of a certain class interested in the movement, but all classes and denominations.

ITALIAN VICE CONSUL.

Jesse Frazzini Receives Commission From His Government.

Ogden, March 23.—Jesse Frazzini has received his commission from the Italian government as vice consul, with Ogden as headquarters, for which position he was recommended by the Italian consul, P. Corto of Denver, who last year visited Ogden to investigate the necessity of such an appointment and reported favorably on the same. Ogden is headquarters for a large colony of the natives of sunny Italy, who transact a majority of their business through Mr. Frazzini. He is a man of education and extensive knowledge as to the needs of his fellow countrymen, among whom he is very popular. Mr. Frazzini is in business here in Ogden and is connected with an immense banking business in Denver.

DISPUTE OVER SCHOOL LAND.

The case of the board of education against Stephens Brothers to quiet title to a piece of land extending along the south side of the Washington avenue school, was not completed yesterday before Judge Howell, and the hearing will be continued today. The land has been used for school grounds for a quarter of a century, as was testified to by a number of witnesses yesterday, the plaintiff claiming that the title to the property was given them by the "Mormon" Church. The controversy over the property arose in April, 1903, when the Stephens placed a wire fence on the land, which Supt. Allison and several assistants removed, the defendants replaced the fence, but the board of education got out an injunction against them and had it removed again.

ONE DIVORCE GRANTED AND ONE COMMENCED.

The divorce suit of Clarence S. Crain against Flora A. Crain was heard by the court and a divorce granted by default. The plaintiff testified that it was impossible for him to longer live with his wife because of her uncontrollable temper and cruel treatment towards him. Mrs. Winifred Austin has commenced

divorce proceedings in the district court against Charles E. Austin. The complaint states that the couple were married at Ogden Nov. 17, 1897, and charges that the defendant deserted his wife over a year ago and has failed to provide her with the necessities of life. She prays for a decree of divorce, \$10 per month alimony and restoration of her maiden name, Winifred Fell. The defendant is an employee of the Southern Pacific company.
