

THE MUSICIAN AND THE COUNSELOR.

The following anecdote is told of Tom Cooke, the actor and musician:

At a trial in the Court of King's Bench, June, 1833, betwixt certain publishing tweedledums and tweedledees, as to the alleged piracy of an arrangement of the *Old English Gentleman*—an old English air, by-the-by Cooke was subpoenaed as a witness. On his cross-examination by Sir James Scarlett, afterwards Lord Abinger, for the opposite side, that learned counsel rather flippantly questioned him thus:

"Now, sir, you say that the two melodies are the same, but different; now what do you mean by that, sir?"

To this Tom promptly answered: "I said that the notes in the two copies were alike, but with a different accent, the one being in common time, the other in six-eight time; and, consequently, the position of the accented notes was different."

Sir James—"What is musical accent?"

Cooke—"My terms are a guinea a lesson, sir." (A loud laugh.)

Sir James (rather ruffled)—"Never mind your terms here. I ask you what is musical accent. Can you see it?"

Cooke—"No."

Sir James—"Can you feel it?"

Cooke—"A musician can." (Great laughter.)

Sir James (very angry)—"Now, pray, sir, don't beat about the bush, but explain to his lordship and the jury, who were supposed to know nothing about music, the meaning of what you call accent."

Cooke—"Accent in music is a certain stress laid upon a particular note, in the same manner as you would lay a stress upon any given word for the purpose of being better understood. Thus, if I were to say, 'You are an ass'—it rests on ass; but if I were to say, 'You are an ass'—it rests on you, Sir James."

Reiterated shouts of laughter by the whole court, in which the bench itself joined, followed this repartee. Silence having been at length obtained, the judge, (Lord Denman) with much seeming gravity, accented the chop-fallen counsel thus: "Are you satisfied, Sir James?"

Sir James (deep red as he naturally was, to use poor Jack Revere's own words, had become scarlet in more than name) in a great huff, said: "The witness may go down!"
