## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Sails For Europe**—Col. Nephi W. Clayton sailed Monday from New York to Hamburg en route to Berlin, where he meets his daughter.

**Up to Fourth Story**—The frame work of the Syndicate building is now up to the fourth story, making quite a showing from Second South street.

**Snow Ten Feet Deep**—The forestry service report in fact is snow on the level in American Fork canyon, and that, they say, is no exaggeration—it is on the level.

**Eagles to Hold Roll Call**—The Order of Eagles will hold a roll call on the evening of the first Friday in March in their lodge hall with an elaborate program and banquet.

**Can't Dampen Their Spirits**—S. D. Hays, who returned from a trip to Europe last week, says the Utah visitors are managing to enjoy themselves in spite of the downpour of rain.

**Wool Men to Attend**—The wool men of this state will send delegates to the New York state wool convention at Cheyenne, Feb. 23-25. They will be chosen at tomorrow afternoon's meeting.

**Asked to Be Retired**—Lieutenant L. P. Wilcox of the signal corps National Guard of Utah, has asked to be retired after eight years service in the National Guard, all of which has been spent in the signal corps.

**Elizabeth E. Scott Dead**—Elizabeth E. Scott, aged 21, died of cancer yesterday at her residence 236 Sixth avenue. She was a native of England and had been residing in Salt Lake City for several years.

**Architects Rush Plans**—Architects were to have their entire force of draftsmen working hard in completing plans for the new Commercial club house. The foundations are all in so that the new superstructure can be let in two weeks.

**Benefit Concert Tonight**—A benefit concert will be given this evening in the Twenty-second ward meeting hall in aid of the family of the late Benjamin Haddock and under the direction of Hugh Haddock, a number of his advanced pupils. An excellent program has been prepared.

**Great Lake at High Level**—The level of the great lake is now at the same point that it was at its highest point last summer, and President Nelson of the Salt Lake company has been given to understand that the lake will rise higher than it is at present. He says the water is now higher than it has been for 10 years.

**Will Inspect Plans**—With the exception of the plans of the city market, Mayor Brandford has approved the action of the city council today. He has up the plates, which were recommended to go over the ground with the capitalists who are backing the proposition in order to become thoroughly acquainted with it.

**Referred to Long Beach**—To the postal authorities at Long Beach will be referred complaints made by Salt Lake of the fraud perpetrated by a fruit shipping company of the California town. Details of the deception have been given to Inspector C. H. Lowe by J. E. Gallagher and others, who were victims of the scheme.

**Bankers to Meet**—The bank clerks will have an interesting program at Thursday night meeting in the Commercial club's parlors. Charles H. Wolfe of the Utah National bank will read a paper on "Loans and Discounts," and Clayton Thatcher of the Deseret National bank will read a paper on "The History of the Bank of America." The program is also to include musical numbers.

**Ased Woman in Need**—The attention of the Salvation Army has been called to the case of Mrs. L. M. Dowle, 62 years old, reported in urgent need of coal and 500 pounds was sent her. As the Army has spent much money for coal this winter, it is in need of funds. Major John Willis, for 24 years with the Salvation Army, will be in town Saturday. On that day and Sunday there will be special meetings.

**Money Ready to Spend**—The \$400,000 worth of new and water bonds recently issued by the city have been delivered to the City National bank of New York City and the money can now be realized on them. City Recorder John H. Morrison has delivered the bonds, communicated to this effect yesterday. He will visit Yale college where he has a son, and then he will take a trip to Washington.

**State Leases Offices**—The state completed the contract with the county commissioners yesterday for the lease of office room for the officials on the county's side of the building, for a period of five years. The rental is \$5,000 but a clause in the contract provides that the agreement may be terminated by a six-months' notice. This was inserted because it is probable that the Capitol building will be erected before its expiration.

## EX-GOVERNOR OF VERMONT HERE

Fletcher D. Proctor Decidedly  
Interested in Prohibition  
Movement in Utah.

### MORMONS MISUNDERSTOOD

Says People in His State Are Posted  
On Their History—Party Entered  
by Julius E. Wells.

Fletcher D. Proctor, former governor of the state of Vermont, was among the guests registered at the Knutsford yesterday. During his stay in the city he was the guest of Julius E. Wells, who arranged with the First Presidency for a special organ rental in the tabernacle and otherwise took charge of Mr. Proctor's party.

Aside from being one of the most prominent Republicans in the state of Vermont, president of the Vermont Marble company and identified in numerous business propositions, Mr. Proctor is an enthusiastic prohibitionist. For fifty years Vermont was a prohibition state, then local option was tried, and now the state is rapidly drifting back into the prohibition ranks, as out of 246 towns within its borders at the last election some 23 only voted in favor of the saloon in their midst.

**SITUATION IN VERMONT.**  
Yesterday Mr. Proctor, in answer to a question, said: "Sixty years ago the state of Vermont went from the prohibitionary law to the local option law, and while the change in my opinion, resulted in a large increase in the sale of liquor throughout the state, each year has shown a smaller number of towns voting for license, and the only hope of the temperance people of the state under the present law is to secure practical prohibition through securing a 'no vote' in practically all the towns and cities."

**INTERESTED IN UTAH.**  
Mr. Proctor is deeply interested in the movement for prohibition in Utah and asked numerous questions regarding the fight. He recognized incidentally a local all the "arguments" in favor of high license, local option, etc., that are being advanced by the friends of the liquor interests, as old friends which crop up in every state where the subject of prohibition is agitated.

**TRIBUTE TO MORMONS.**  
Mr. Proctor is decidedly interested in Utah and Utah people, and is posted on the history of the Church from the beginning. "My father thought a great deal of the Mormon people," he declared, "and I often heard him speak of the injustices and hardships they endured in the past. I want to say that among business men of the east the Mormon people as a class are held in respect and their reputation everywhere is that they pay their bills."

Julius E. Wells of this city, he said, made a number of friends in Vermont when he was there closing up the purchase of the site of the Joseph Smith monument two or three years ago. At the tabernacle yesterday afternoon the party went into rapures over the organ as manipulated by J. J. McChesney, and after Mrs. Emma Ramsey Morris had completed singing "The Flag Without a Star," one and all congratulated both the singer and the accompanist. One of the party at this juncture said something about it hardly looked as though the Mormons were in rebellion, as certain yellow journals would have the people understand, whereupon Mr. Proctor promptly interjected, "Bosh, the Mormons are a greatly misunderstood people, but we back in Vermont understand them all right."

During their visit here the party was shown the city under the escort of Julius E. Wells and Nephi L. Merrill. The party, which consisted of Governor Fletcher D. Proctor, Mr. Proctor, Miss Emma Morris, Mr. Proctor, Mrs. E. A. Wells, Mr. Proctor, Mr. A. W. Edson, is on its way to Los Angeles and the Pacific coast resorts.

**SHOULD KEEP BUILDING.**  
General Secretary Stone of Y. M. C. A. of Portland Talks.

General Secretary H. W. Stone of the Portland, Or., Y. M. C. A. is at the Knutsford. He says there ought to be no trouble in raising the \$145,000 necessary to pay off the Salt Lake association's debt. "We have secured money to build three buildings in Portland in the last 12 years. The third, now nearing completion, has nine floors and will cost \$750,000, the total value of the property and furnishings to represent an investment of about \$500,000. We expect to be in it by September. Which one stops to think that almost every city of 20,000 or more in the west has erected a new Y. M. C. A. building in the last five years, it is difficult to believe that Salt Lake will stand for the loss of the fine building it has already. This is about the most enterprising thing in the city, and you will understand why I am convinced that you will succeed here."
