## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Girls' Society to Meet.**—The annual meeting of the Utah Girls' Friendly society will be held Saturday afternoon, in St. Mark's Sunday school room.

**Tooele Growing Fast.**—F. E. McGurkin has been making an automobile trip to Tooele, and reports that the town is growing fast, and assuming the appearance of a town of some importance.

**To Expel Minister.**—Rev. Peter G. Weubben, the Zion Evangelical church, formerly resident in this city, has been expelled from the church, following charges of drinking.

**Alumni Banquet Monday.**—The annual banquet of the Utah Light & Railway building, on "Five Tips to Success," by a lecturer from the Sheldon School of Correspondence. The lecture is for the employees of the company.

**To Seek National Anthem.**—Governor William Spry has been elected an honorary member for life of the National Song society. He received the word yesterday to this effect. The society is in search of a national anthem just at present and Governor Spry is asked to look out for one.

**Wool Convention Dates.**—Secretary Walker of the National Wool Growers' association has notified Secretary Stewart of the Utah Wool Growers' association that the dates for the next annual convention of the National association, will be the Thursday, Friday and Saturday, Jan. 6, 7, and 8, 1910 next, at Ogden.

**Old Time Advertisers.**—A local antiquarian has deciphered on the stone steps of the entrance to the old Deseret News building the names of several prominent men doing business here early in the fifties. Among these were E. D. Woolley and Thomas Williams. These names were painted on the stone for advertising purposes.

**Danger in the Trip.**—Parties having occasion to travel over to Antelope island or late report the depth of water increasing so that it is dangerous to make the trip any longer on horseback. Mrs. Renshaw avers that the defendant encouraged her boy to throw rocks and stones at the Renshaw boy.
