

DR. P. D. McLEOD UNDER ARREST.

Charged With Performing Illegal
Operation on Susan Geary, the
Cambridge Chorus Girl.

HER BODY WAS DISMEMBERED

Was Called, it is Alleged, into Case
After First Operation Failed—
Nathan is Recovering

Boston, Nov. 3.—Following a brief conversation by officers over the long distance telephone, the scene of developments in the famous suit case mystery has shifted from New York back to Boston. Dr. Percy D. McLeod, a reputable physician of the Black Bay district, was arrested today on the charge of performing an illegal operation on Susan Geary, the Cambridge chorus girl, whose remains were found in two suit cases in the waters of Boston harbor.

Through the confessions of Lewis Crawford and William Howard, the two men arrested in New York yesterday, the authorities received evidence which in their opinion warranted the arrest of Dr. McLeod this afternoon. It is alleged that Dr. McLeod was called into the case after the first operation was performed in the Tremont street office and that he performed a second operation of a desperate nature in the vain attempt to save the life of the young woman. Miss Geary failed to recover, and it is alleged that Dr. McLeod in an effort to conceal crime, dismembered the body.

Dr. McLeod will be arraigned in court tomorrow. No sum has been set to fight as the amount of his bail bond, but Dist. Atty. M. J. Sughrue stated that owing to the gravity of the charge, a large bond would be necessary. Morris Nathan, the lover of Miss Geary, who has been arrested in Pittsburgh last Saturday night and brought to this city in a state of collapse, is gradually recovering at the city hospital, where he was taken on his arrival here, but is not yet in a condition to be brought into court. Nathan will probably be arraigned in court Monday.

While at first the police were of the opinion that Nathan was not directly connected with the case, they now say that Nathan conducted the negotiations with the proprietors of the Tremont street establishment, and the place with which Crawford was connected, and that he was fully aware of the result of the operation.

Today the police directed their efforts toward locating another man formerly connected with the Tremont street office.

Bledsoe Powell, the city architect, made another report, informing the mayor that the powerhouse of the new municipal hospital is in an unfinished condition and that Henderson & Co., the contractors, have received the full contract price for erecting the building.
