Whaling Fleet in Danger

San Francisco, Nov. 3.—Whaling steamer William Baylies, one of the vessels which escaped the grip of the Arctic ice, arrived here today with over 30,000 pounds of whalebone and the oil from 16 whales. The value of her cargo is estimated at \$100,000.

Capt. Parker, master of the Baylies first went from Unalaska to the sea, but the whaling fleet had been caught in the ice. Experienced whalers now know that it is impossible for all of the imprisoned vessels to remain intact until the sea opens, and those which do so will have to face the danger of the breaking up of the ice floes in the spring.
