That which took place in St. Petersburg on Jan. 22 is nothing in comparison to what is taking place in Manchuria." In conclusion, Count Tolstol says that in America, France, Germany, Japan and England the pernicious oharacter of the governments is so marked that those beionging to those nations point to events in Russia and naively imagine what is done in Russia is done only in Russia, while they enjoy complete free-dom and need no improvement of their tom and need no improvement of their

### OREGON LAND FRAUDS

Seey. Hitchcock Makes Statement Concerning Them.

Washington, March 10 .- Secy. Hitch-Washington, March 10.-Secy. Hitch-cock today gave out a statement con-cerning the investigation made by the department of the interior into the irregularities in Oregon in connection with the public lands. It shows that there have been 68 indictments and six convictions. Of the indictments 52 are for complease to defraud the 52 are for conspiracy to defraud the government, and the others for the

government, and the others for the various crimes of perjury, subornation of perjury, obstructing the administra-tion of justice, etc. The persons indicted include one United States senator, J. H. Mitchell; two congressmen, Binger Hermann and John N. Williamson; eight attorneys, one state and two ex-state senators; an ex-assistant United States attorney, and his deputy; an ex-surveyor general ex-assistant United States attorney, and his deputy; an ex-surveyor general and deputy; and several deputy sur-veyors; ex-examiners of surveys, ex-secretary general, one United States commissioner and two ex-commis-sioners, and a number of land and tim-ber dealers and homesteaders. The names of two women appear in the list, one of them being Emma L. Watson, convicted of conspiracy, and the other, Nellie Brown, indicted for the same offense.

#### Folk Signs Breeders Bill.

Jefferson City, Mo., March 10.-Gov. Folk tonight signed the Breeders law repeal bill. This measure kills existing repeat bill. This measure wills existing statutes prohibiting bookmaking and pool selling, except in certain enclo-sures. There is at present no speci-fic law against bookmaking or pool selling in the state, and unless the new being in the state, and unless the house bill which has been passed by the house is passed by the senate the several communities will be forced to prose-cute betting on horse races under the general gambling laws.

#### Hawaiian Trade Statistics.

Hawaiian Trade Statistics. San Francisco, March 11.—The fol-lowing official statistics of the Ha-valian trade have been received here: the value of domestic shipments from San Francisco to the Hawaiian Islands varies from \$9,500,000 to \$10,500,000 an-ually. Merchandise imported into the district of Hawaii from foreign coun-tries for the year ending June 30, 1903, amounted to \$3,142,018; for the year ending June 30, 1904, to \$3,797,642. The exports to foreign countries for the year ending June 30, 1903, were \$32,-569, and for the year ending June 30, 1904, \$47,620. The shipments to the Unit-ed States were \$26,243,650 in 1902-3, and \$25,157,556 in 1903-4.
