

TALK OF THE TOWN.

Attend your Sabbath meetings. Secretary Thomas is back from the south. One solitary drunk was fined \$10 to-day. Mary Emery won the race yesterday. The 18th district school opens on Monday. The checker match will finish on Monday. Go to the Careless Orchestra on Monday night. The High Council meet on Monday, at 7:30 p.m. Home missionaries will visit the country wards to-morrow. The directors of the D. A. & M. Society meet to-night. Hon. Wm. Grosbeck, of Ohio, and party are expected here to-night. Work on the new meeting house of the 18th Ward has recommenced. A case of "drunk and disorderly" was taken in hand by the police this afternoon. The Careless Orchestra chorus will meet for rehearsal at 8 p.m. Sunday. An extensive fire is raging in the Ogden Mountains. Dense volumes of smoke are rising from that direction. J. H. Freeman, of the 10th Ward, has raised some fine specimens of "hemp trees." He exhibited one 17 feet high. Philander Brown, of Provo, lost \$200 worth of property, in barns, sheds and hay, by an accidental fire on Thursday evening. Mr. David R. Beebe and Miss Nancy D. Smoot, of Provo, were married last Thursday. The bride is a daughter of President A. O. Smoot. President George Q. Cannon, Elder George Goddard and others, started this afternoon for Grantsville, to attend the Sunday School jubilee to be held there to-morrow.

The "Contributor" Prospectus.—The third volume of the Contributor will commence with the October number. Each number will contain thirty-two pages of choice reading matter, including the sermons and writings of the Prophet Joseph Smith, accompanied with biographical articles of the Prophet and Patriarch. Historical sketches of the Buchanan campaign of 1857, and the usual quota of historical, biographical, scientific, literary and miscellaneous writings will appear in the volume. Two magnificent steel plate engravings of Joseph and Hyrum Smith will illustrate the October number.

Monthly Meeting of the Sunday School Union.—The regular monthly meeting of the Deseret Sunday School Union will be held next Monday evening, at half past 7 o'clock, in the Salt Lake Assembly Hall.

The 10th Ward Sunday School will furnish music and doorknockers for the occasion. The 11th Ward Sunday School, Marial Band, will also be in attendance. Elder H. Barton, by request, will give an illustration of oral teaching adapted to the younger pupils of Sunday Schools.

Fire in the Mountains.—About 2 o'clock this afternoon, the startling information was telegraphed to the City Hall, that a fire had broken out in the 7th Ward. The brigade immediately got out their apparatuses and started full tilt for the scene of action. They ran as far as the County Court House but seemed to get no nearer to the fire, and it gradually began to dawn upon them that they were pursuing a "will-o-the-wisp." The thick cloud of smoke which darkened the western heavens, were not coming from any point in the 7th Ward, but from the Ogden Mountains, where a conflagration is in progress, doubtless among the timbers of that region. The firemen ascertaining this, finally came to a stop and returned to the hall wiser and warmer men. The smoke is still rising from the hills, and seems to ascend from the vicinity of one peak, giving it the aspect of a belching volcano.

Priesthood Meeting.—The regular meeting of the Priesthood of the Salt Lake Stake convened at 11 a.m. to-day, President A. M. Cannon presiding. Present also, Counsellors Jos. E. Taylor and D. O. Calder, and Apostle J. H. Smith. The roll call showed all the wards represented by some of the authorities, excepting the 12th, 13th and 20th city wards, and the Mill Creek and Granite wards. The usual business having been dispatched, the President stated that the time could be occupied by any who had items of business to present. Pursuant to this, he stated that recently persons bearing recommendations from their Bishops to the House of the Lord, had been necessarily refused the endorsement of the Presidency of the Stake, for the reason that they were not eligible candidates. It had been hard to convince such applicants that they were not unjustly discriminated against. After enumerating the qualifications necessary for applicants to possess, the speaker exhorted the Bishops to faithfully carry out the instructions in the future. Elder William Griffin asked the question if it was material, in the administration of the sacrament, for the one officiating to kneel, while blessing the emblems. President Cannon, in reply, read from the Doctrine and Covenants, where the one officiating is instructed to "kneel with the Church." He gave it as his belief that where circumstances would permit, the Elder and the whole congregation should kneel together; but he had witnessed the sacrament administered under the direction of the Prophet Joseph when the assembly did not kneel, and had seen the same under President Young's administration. He did not feel disposed to say that it was wrong for the Elder and congregation not to kneel in such cases. Apostle John H. Smith said he thought it was proper to conform as strictly as possible to the written word, where circumstances permitted. He thought the question of a man's faithfulness did not depend on the position of his body, but on the condition of his heart, while praying; nevertheless where it could be done, he believed in strict conformity to the written commandment. He touched upon and deprecated the practice of some in authority, of railing and belaboring men in public meetings, often over personal differences, naming men outright and holding up them and their faults to ridicule. This, he said, was not only cowardly and unjust, but really detrimental, and no man, with his consent or sanction would indulge in it. He exhorted all who did to desist, and take the opposite course, laid down in the Scriptures, viz., to go privately to an offending brother or sister, and with the spirit of love seek to reform them and correct their errors. When such means failed, Bishops' Courts and High Councils could be called into requisition. He did not know that any cases of this kind had occurred here, but he had found one or two during his recent travels. He said that a Bishop had no more right to pulpitize his members, than the latter had to go into the stand and treat his Bishop in the same manner. Counselor Joseph E. Taylor read from the Book of Mormon, where Christ administered the Sacrament to the Nephites, and blessed it while they were seated upon the ground. He said that in his opinion there was virtue in a living oracle which justified some deviation from the written word. Instantly the command, "Thou shalt not kill," for the violation of which Cain was so terribly punished, and yet a subsequent command was given to Abraham, from the same source, to offer up his only son upon the altar. If Abraham had adhered strictly to the written law and refused to signify his willingness to obey the Divine voice, he would not have been accounted faithful. The giver of the law has the right to deviate from it, if he sees proper. He also spoke of some of the evils which had crept into the Church, urged their correction, and advised brotherly kindness and sympathy for the erring, and the faithful performance of duty on the part of all. President Cannon referred to a few of these evils, and some of the positive expressions sometimes used at meetings by the home missionaries and other preachers. He deprecated such utterances, and advised speakers to employ choice language, such as would not offend the ears of the pure and refined. Evils could be denounced just as well by chaste language as with the opposite. He added a few remarks on temperance, and the necessity to discountenance and put down all contrary practices. Men who prey especially should not deal in intoxicating liquors. After singing, the meeting adjourned for one month.

The Ogden Depot Question.—It is probable that the long-talked of question of permanent buildings for the various railroads running through Ogden, will soon be settled. We learn from the Herald of that city that on Thursday afternoon a special train of the C. P. R. R. brought the following leading officials of that road to Ogden: J. A. Fillmore, Asst. Gen. Superintendent; S. S. Montague, Chief Engineer; A. D. Wilder, Div. Supt. of the Oakland Ward; Arthur Brown, W. G. Curtis, Supt. of Tracks; Chalmers Scott, Engineer. After their arrival the party were busy most of the time, inspecting the grounds as to their suitability for new depot buildings, etc., and the same inspection and investigation were pursued during the forenoon of yesterday. At one o'clock in the afternoon the party of the U. P. officials who left for the north a few days ago, returned on a special car of the U. & N., accompanied by Supt. Geo. W. Thatcher, of the latter road, and the afternoon was occupied by the two parties in a conference, the result of which has not yet been made public.

OBITUARY. JOHN FIDO died at Columbus, Ohio, and was buried in Greenlawn Cemetery, on Sunday, July 24th, 1881. He was born in the Parish of Walworth, Hove, England, September 18th 1796, and was consequently in his 85th year. At an early age he joined the British Naval Service and afterwards enlisted in the British army, serving his country about seventeen years. He traveled in most parts of the world and in 1844 settled in Columbus. But he did not remain there long, his desire for change inducing him to visit many parts of the United States. He embraced the gospel, and in Nauvoo he became acquainted with the prophet Joseph, the Patriarch Hyrum, and President Brigham Young and John Taylor. He subsequently went to England and, returning, took up his abode again in Columbus, where he died in full faith of the gospel, expressing his desire to be recorded in the patriarchal order.
