FORTY-SEVENTH CONGRESS.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 12.—Grover from

the military committee, reported

favorably, as amended, the Senate

bill granting certain right of way to

the San Francisco and Ocean

Shore Railroad Company.

Garland introduced an amendment

to the recent Geneva award act,

providing for the claims of British

owners of property seized when under

the American flag.

Johnson's resolution, providing that

Senator with a \$12,000 clerk was re-

jected; yeas 20, nays 28.

The Senate bill to give every officer

whose name is borne on the

naval list fifty-five years, and who

has served full term as chief of

bureau, the rank (that of Commodore),

which he would have if he was re-

jected while chief of bureau, was re-

jected; yeas 20, nays 28.

Messrs. Plumb, Dawes and Cook-

rell were constituted conferees on

the district appropriation bill.

Blair made a speech upon the ill-

literacy in States and urged

need for adequate appropriation in

the aid of common schools.

Allison reported back from the

finance committee, with amend-

ments the House bank charter ex-

extension bill. Ordered printed and

recommitted.

The Japanese indemnity bill was

considered in committee. Messrs.

Morrill's amendment ordering the

distribution of bonds in which the

fund was invested prevailed; yeas

27, nays 23.

The only notable feature of the

remainder of the proceedings in

committee of the whole, was a

speech by Logan, denunciatory of

the principle of prize money and

explaining of the inconsistency of

allowing interest upon it for the

benefit of the Wyoming, after the

payment of interest on the money

returned to Japan had been refused.

The conclusion of the committee

is not to pay Japan the accumulated

interest which the indemnity had

been reiterated in the Senate,

by 25 to 12.

Upon the passage of the bill, sev-

eral of its original advocates, Con-

gress, Butler, and George, stated their

opposition to it in view of the change

made by the Senate.

Sherman said he would vote

against it because he believed it to

be a sensational bill, and thought

that money was not due Japan.

Logan said he would vote for it

because it did not suit him.

[Laughter.] He deprecated higgling

over the question from one Congress

to another, and asserted the return

of the interest as well as the principal

was essential to vindicate the

honor and credit of the nation.

The bill passed, 35 to 13.

The bill as passed authorizes and

directs the President to pay the

government of Japan \$78,000 in

legal coin through the United States

minister to Japan, and directs that

all bills be collected or controlled

by the State Department and de-

signed in the department reports

shall be cancelled and destroyed.

WASHINGTON, 13.—In the Star

ferent ink from that of the body of

the petition. He had only a general

recollection of other letters referring

to the route.

Committee Reports.

The Senate finance committee

agreed to recommend the House bill

for the extension of the national

bank charter to be amended by the

incorporating therein as additional

sections, the two amendments sub-

mitted by Sherman and Allison, re-

specting the first instant, which

provides for the issue of 3 per cent.

bonds in exchange for any 24 per

cent, and for the issue of gold cer-

tificates.

The sub-committee of the House

committee on elections will report

to the full committee that Small,

Republican, is entitled to the seat

from the fifth district of South Car-

olina.
