#### A Picturesque Valley in the Great Forest Reserve.

Greer, Apache Co., Arizona, Feb. 7.-This little ward'is slituated in Lee val-ley, on the head of the Little Colorado. The valley is quite narrow, and its alti-tude is between seven and eight thousand feet above sea level, and is con-sequently subject to late and early frosts. Surrounded as it is with pine forests, it is a picturesque situation, and an idea dairyland in the forest reserve. There are now only nine families in the ward, and some of the people have become discouraged and are seek-ing homes elsewhere--still those who have lived here have done fairly well.
