

FIXING UP PEACE IN CENTRAL AMERICA

American Warship Tendered as Place for Meeting of the Commissioners.

LEGATION ARRANGES DETAILS.

Salvador and Honduras Enter Into an Alliance, Nature of Which is Unknown.

Washington, July 16.—The navy department was informed this afternoon by cablegram from Commander Mulligan of the arrival of his ship, the Marblehead, at La Libertad, Panama, which port he left last Friday night. Before sailing Commander Mulligan was instructed by the navy department to report to the American minister, Mr. Coombs, at La Libertad, which is the port near San Salvador, the capital of Salvador.

In the absence of Mr. Coombs, who is detained at Champerles, awaiting next Friday's steamer, Mr. Brown, the American secretary in Salvador, will communicate with Commander Mulligan, and that officer will place his ship at the disposal of the American legation, so that Mr. Brown will be in a position to carry out the instructions which were cabled him today from Washington to prefer to the governments of Salvador and Guatemala the use of this American warship as a place of meeting of the peace commissioners. The details of the meeting will be left to the American legation. It is stated that neither Minister Merry nor Messrs. Coombs and Brown, will act in the capacity of peace commissioners to either country; they are charged simply as good friends to both parties to endeavor to bring the hostile nations into friendly relations without further loss of blood.

It is believed that the Marblehead will take the San Salvadorians at La Libertad and then proceed to the nearest Guatemalan port, San Jose, where the agents of that government will board the ship, which will then go to sea beyond the three-mile limit until the conference opens. The important development of the day, aside from the offer of the Marblehead, was an assurance to the state department from President Cabrera that Guatemala would refrain from further hostilities in Salvador, and undertake to do the same, which news was promptly communicated to Minister Merry at San Salvador, in order that he might transmit the proposition to the government at that place.

Another point developed was that Salvador and Honduras have entered into an alliance, the nature of which is not certainly known, but it is believed by the officials here that the purpose is to agree upon the terms of peace that shall be proposed by the two countries in Guatemala. This news came to the state department from Charge Brown at Guatemala City. Still another cablegram, this one from Minister Merry, informed the state department that the government of Honduras insists upon being considered along with Salvador in the peace negotiations with Guatemala. Altogether, the prospect of the peaceful termination of the present difficulty is believed to have brightened considerably during the day.

LEISHMAN'S CREDENTIALS.

As Ambassador He Will Soon Present Them at Constantinople.

Naples, July 16.—Minister Leishman is here on his way to Constantinople, where he will present his credentials as ambassador within a fortnight. He says he does not anticipate any difficulties, the reports to that effect being the results of misunderstandings concerning the intention of the United States to take a more active part in the Armenian and other questions in the near east. There is reason to believe certain countries encouraged this view for the purpose of diminishing American influence in Turkey.

NO RUSH TO FILE ON CROW RESERVATION LANDS.

Billings, Mont., July 16.—The local land office opened this morning for the filing on the lands of the Crow reservation, drawing for which took place in this city July 2, 3 and 4. Of the 15 names slated for entry today only 15 appeared to take advantage of their chance to get a homestead. This is only a small fraction over 60 per cent, and is a much smaller number than was predicted by even the most conservative. If there is a proportionate increase each day, officials who have participated in former drawings say that after the total number of filings there will be something like 3,000 homesteads which may be filed upon by any one eligible after Sept. 15.

JEROME AND FOLK.

Georgia Legislators Endorse Them For Presidential Team in 1908.

Atlanta, Ga., July 16.—William Travers Jerome, district attorney of New York city, and Francis P. Folke, left today for the lower branch of the Georgia legislature. A short recess from the regular labors of the session was taken and Mr. Jerome, upon invitation, addressed the legislators. He spoke briefly of the relations of the two states, and of the fact that there is little difference in the ways of thinking and doing business between the two sections, and suggested that whatever misunderstandings had existed in recent years had come largely from sensational writing. Following his address, the enthusiastic legislators adopted a resolution endorsing "Jerome and Folke" for the Democratic presidential team in 1908.

In an interview here today regarding the Thaw murder case in New York, Mr. Jerome referred to the case as "the every-day police court case."

"In the eyes of the law," he continued, "the defendant's millions add no lustre to his situation. Most of the apparent romance is a newspaper product."

Mr. Jerome and his assistants, in the district attorney's office, Messrs. Arthur Van Diver and Francis P. Folke, left today for Warm Springs, Ga., where they will be the guests of the Georgia Bar association and before which body Mr. Jerome will deliver an address tomorrow or Wednesday.

CHESTER THOMPSON.

Arraigned and Father Enters Plea of "Not Guilty."

Seattle, Wash., July 16.—Chester Thompson, the young son of Atty. Will H. Thompson, this morning stood in the superior court and heard Prosecuting Atty. MacKintosh read the information which formally charges him with murder in the first degree for the killing of former Judge George Meade Emory. Young Thompson maintained himself with the utmost calmness during the few minutes required for the formality and left the courtroom for his cell in the county jail accompanied by his father and brother. Deputy County Clerk Morris Thompson, both of whom were with him when he entered the courtroom.

Thompson was represented by his father, who in the defendant's behalf, entered a plea of not guilty, remarking that in so doing he reserved the right to deny to the complaint if it should be deemed desirable to do so at a later time. No date was set for the trial.

ISLE OF PINES AMERICANS.

Excited Over the Imprisonment of Three Americans.

Havana, July 16.—American residents of this island are excited over the imprisonment in the common jail at Nueva Gerona of Miss Millie Brown, 19 years of age; L. C. Giltner, postmaster of the town of Columbia and William Augustine, all Americans. The three, for their own protection and amusement, had constructed a toy telegraph line 1,500 feet long, strung from Giltner's store to the residences of the other two. They were arrested without warning, charged with the violation of an old military order prohibiting the use of telegraphs, and sentenced to a term of imprisonment of 30 days. All refused to submit to the payment of the fine and were taken to jail to serve 35 days each. The jail has no accommodations for female prisoners.

The Cuban government has no report of the incident, which is reported by Americans here from the Isle of Pines.

LAND FRAUD ARRESTS.

U. S. Judge Quarles Releases Three Prisoners.

Milwaukee, July 16.—Joseph and John Black and August Anderson of Shawnee, Wis., who were recently arrested by a United States marshal on indictments relating to the Oregon land frauds were today released by United States District Judge Quarles upon habeas corpus proceedings. These men were remanded to the custody of the United States marshal by Court Commissioner Kellogg at Appleton last week and were committed to jail in default of \$2,000 bail. Court Commissioner Kellogg has been cited by Judge Quarles to show cause why they should not be given their freedom.

DENVER ELECTION CASE.

Denver, Colo., July 16.—Attorneys for the utility corporations today appeared before Judge Armour of the Thirteenth judicial district, sitting temporarily in Judge Booth's place, in division of the local district court, and asked for a writ of prohibition to stop the election contest proceedings before Judge Ben B. Lindsey of the county court. Judge Armour declined to grant the writ until he had heard from the attorneys on the other side. The matter went over until tomorrow.

STREETCAR MEN'S DEMANDS.

Portland, Ore., July 16.—The Streetcar Men's union today decided to ignore demand that the Portland Railway, Light & Power company, which operates all the streetcar lines in Portland, reinstate E. J. McKinney, a motorman who was recently discharged by the company, grant a full scale of 27 cents an hour in place of a sliding scale of from 21 to 25 cents, and shut the working hours of the employees.

NO RECEIVER FOR LITTLE KANAWHA SYNDICATE.

Cincinnati, July 16.—United States Judge Thompson today refused to appoint a receiver for the Little Kanawha syndicate's property in West Virginia.

The motion for the appointment of receiver was made by attorneys representing John S. Jones, a Chicago capitalist.

Jones asked for a receiver for the property some months ago, when he sued George J. Gould, Joseph Ramsey and William Gay, trustees of the syndicate, and the Little Kanawha syndicate.

In that suit he claimed that Ramsey and Gay had been running the syndicate's affairs to suit themselves, and they did not consult him or the syndicate in handing down his decision from the bench Judge Thompson said in his opinion the trustees did not know of the granting of an injunction, and added that there is no need of appointing a receiver, as Gould, Ramsey and Gay are each personally able to pay whatever the courts decide to be Jones's interest in the property.

KILLING OF ZULUS.

Alleged Refusal to Grant Quarter Will Be Investigated.

London, July 16.—Premier Campbell-Bannerman, replying to a question in the house of commons today, said the government had already made telegraphic inquiries regarding the reported refusal to grant quarter to a wounded Zulu, as announced in a dispatch from Johannesburg this morning. The premier said he had been greatly shocked by the report. If there was any foundation for it the matter would receive the closest and most earnest attention of the government.

NEW MEXICAN TOWNS.

SHAKEN BY EARTHQUAKE.

Santa Fe, N. M., July 16.—Considerable property damage was done this afternoon at Escondido, San Mateo and nearby settlements by an earthquake shock which was the severest of the 200 shocks that have occurred in the past two years. The shocks are local and are caused by earth slides in the Magdalena mountains.

WINSTON CHURCHILL.

ACCEPTS THE PLATFORM.

Concord, N. H., July 16.—A platform adopted by the Lincoln Republican club at a meeting here yesterday was accepted by Winston Churchill, who has been mentioned as a candidate for governor of New Hampshire. The platform sets forth the desire of the club for the enactment of laws prohibiting the giving of free railroad transportation, passes, mileage books or other special contracts to delegates of political conventions, governmental officials or any other persons not properly entitled thereto, a corrupt practice act which shall prohibit political contributions by corporations and require publicity of receipts and expenditures.

In his letter of acceptance Mr. Churchill says in part: "I subscribe without reservation to the several propositions today set forth and would suggest that they be submitted to the other candidates for governor. If they will all assent, the success of the cause is assured and that is more to me than any personal consideration. In such event, if thought desirable, I would gladly offer myself in behalf of such one of the other candidates as the Lincoln Republican club thought fit to endorse."

ST. LOUIS BOODLE CASES.

Just One Left Open, That of Robert Snyder.

St. Louis, July 16.—The last of St. Louis' noted boodle cases, with one exception, was disposed of today when Circuit Atty. Sager nolle prossed three charges, two of bribery and one of perjury, against James Drake, a former member of the house of delegates. Mr. Sager announced that Mr. Drake had turned state's evidence and had been used in the prosecutions of the alleged boodle combine. The charges were then wiped from the docket. This action leaves only one of the boodle cases open, that of Robert Snyder, the Kansas City promoter and capitalist, against whom revised charges have been filed.

GEN. WARFIELD KILLED.

San Francisco, Cal., July 16.—Gen. W. H. Warfield, a former brigade commander of the state militia, at one time proprietor of the California hotel and who was appointed on the new board of public commissioners last night, was killed in an automobile accident at Mill valley late this afternoon.

ORANGE GRAND LODGE.

Toronto, Ont., July 17.—The imperial grand lodge council of the Orange grand lodge of the world opened its tenth session here yesterday. Many British, American and Canadian delegates are here. At this session it is expected a new ritual will be adopted.

MIDWAY ISLAND LIGHTHOUSE.

Washington, July 16.—The Irons has sailed from Honolulu for Midway island to make a survey of the inner reef, with a view to locating a lighthouse to aid navigators. At present there is no light of any kind save those of the few low houses on the island. The report that it is contemplated to establish a naval coaling station at Midway is said to be erroneous. In fact, there is no sufficient depth of water inside the reef enclosing the island to float any but a small ship, and the entrance through the reef is precarious.

ENTERTAINERS LONGWORTH.

Paris, July 16.—Foreign Minister Bourgeois gave a dinner today to Ambassador McCormick and Congressman and Mrs. Nicholas Longworth, being his first official function since he assumed the ministry. The guests included a number of cabinet ministers and ambassadors and all the members

of the Buchanan delegation which went to Washington in 1902. Mr. and Mrs. Longworth will leave Paris tomorrow by automobile for Bayreuth.

FOREST FIRES IN WASHINGTON.

Tacoma, Wash., July 16.—Serious forest fires are raging near Ashford, on the line of the Tacoma Eastern railway, threatening the mill of the National Lumber company, which was recently built and has been operating only a few months.
