**EASTERN DISPATCHES.**  
CINCINNATI, 2.—The convention re-assembled at 3 p.m., and the hall was densely crowded. The committee on permanent organization reported Carl Schurz for president, with a vice president from each State. The vice presidents were George C. Lyon of Nevada, and J. H. Johnson of Oregon. Schurz was conducted to the chair amid tumultuous applause, and being seated he congratulated the convention on the vast assemblage from all parts of the country, without emotions of astonishment and hope, something to be congratulated on. He said something more than that was wanted; not a change of persons but the overthrow of a pernicious system; not another president merely, but a better president, and closed by saying that stood on the threshold of a great victory, which surely would be theirs if they were united.

THE NEW BRITISH PRINTING MACHINE.  
Our transatlantic cousins are congratulating us on the fact that we have perfected a new and improved printing machine equal to Hoe's American one, and boast of its excellence in terms of the strongest character. It is called the "Walter Press," and is the result of invention, economy, and excellence of work, as such as to astonish those who have had intimate knowledge of what had previously been done by Hoe's and other fast printing machines. The Walter Press prints on both sides of the sheet at one operation. There is less ink used; fewer rollers required; a diminished number of blankets is demanded, and we are told that the printing details of the machine are so simple and solid, that, with ordinary care, there is nothing liable to get out of order.  
The "Scottish" says: "As the 'Walter' is now printed a neat of tightly rolled paper, in the form in which it leaves the paper mill, fully four miles in length, and weighing nearly six cwt., is cut at one end of the machine, and in the process of unrolling is damped, printed first on one side and then on the reverse with uniform precision, is cut into sheets, and the waste of paper is less than twenty-five copies per hour, at the other end of the machine. The delivery is made on two boards, each of which receives a sheet of paper. The boards are watched by lads, who, notwithstanding the great speed, have still time to see that the work is properly done. The sheet attendance necessary are these two lads at the delivery boards and the third, the striker, who starts the machine and looks after the rolls as they are unrolling. While printing the paper travels through the machine at the rate of nearly one thousand feet per minute, and a roll of paper four times thus printed in less than twenty-five minutes. The delay in changing from one roll to another scarcely exceeds a minute, so that the production is thus almost continuous."—American Newspaper Reporter.
