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THE IDAHO TEST OATH.

The Arguments Before the United States Supreme Court.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 10. [Special to the Deseret News.]—The argument of Judge John W. Wilson, in the Idaho test case, was made yesterday, and was very clear and logical. He said that the law-making department had no right to go into the domain of conscience and make a man an offender because of his religious belief. This was precisely what the Idaho oath did, by disfranchising a citizen because of his membership in a religious association, and his action was violative of the Constitution of the United States. Judge Wilson cited from numerous authorities and from the decisions of the Supreme Court, in line with his position. During the argument he was listened to attentively by the Court, and numerous questions were asked by the judges.

H. W. Smith, better known as "Kentucky" Smith, who is now a resident of Ogden, but formerly lived in Idaho, and is understood to be the framer of the test oath that is being discussed. He claimed that the oath was not violative of the Constitution, that it was a furtherance of the public policy of the United States, and that it was a necessary condition for citizenship.

The court adjourned last evening before Mr. Smith had concluded his argument. This afternoon he presented his case in the same vein as yesterday.

When he finished, Hon. F. S. Brewer, an excellent lawyer, made a telling speech. "Kentucky" Smith's points were completely met.

It is believed that the court cannot decide against membership in the "Mormon" Church and in favor of the law, on constitutional grounds. The authorities cited were numerous and pointed. Doubts were present during the proceedings.

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TODAY'S SALE OF LAND.

Forty-Eight Lots Under Esquire Peak Disposed of.

There was not quite as large an attendance at the City Hall today as yesterday, for the auction of city lands. The lots on Capitol Hill were not put up, as expected, but four blocks lying almost under and to the south and west of Esquire Peak were announced. The bidding was slow at first, but in a short time was infused into the proceedings. Real estate men generally, however, kept back, and it is understood that they are waiting for Capitol Hill lots. During the sale today lots were disposed of at an average price of a little more than \$200, and \$10,000 was netted for the city treasury. These lots are nearly one-fourth the size of those sold yesterday, averaging 30 by 140 feet. The lowest price taken was \$125, and the highest \$400. BUILDINGS ON CAPITOL HILL.

Governor Thomas Heads a Movement for Congressional Action.

Governor Thomas has inaugurated an important movement, and with his accustomed energy and persistence he will no doubt accomplish the object he has in view, and in which he will be warmly seconded by leading business circles. The undertaking is to secure, from this session of Congress, an appropriation for the buildings on Capitol Hill. The amount asked for will be \$500,000, a sum that would pay for the reconstruction of the buildings and improvement of the grounds in a manner that would be a credit to the government. It is believed that at least \$250,000 would be readily given for the purpose, and while this would be sufficient for a magnificent structure, yet a larger amount would be necessary to place the grounds and surroundings in a desirable condition.
