There has been but one case of small-pox at Ogden, and that has recovered, but the patient is still confined, as a precautionary measure.

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

The immigrants.—This in coming company of immigrants in charge of Elder R. R. Irvine, left Council Bluffs this morning. They will probably reach this city on or about Monday.

Tooele Crops.—Mr. W. C. Rydell is in town from Tooele. He states that the crop prospects in that valley are very flattering. The harvesting of oats and barley has already begun. If the wheat can be harvested before the usual summer floods dash down from the mountains, a large yield will be realized.

Fatal Accident.—On the evening of July 2nd, at Glendale, on the Utah and Northern Railroad, Tommy Longley, aged about five years, was run over by a wagon and died in about three hours after the accident. He was attempting to jump while the wagon was in motion. The little fellow was the son of Mrs. John P. Longley.

Broken Arm.—Recently a young man named George Bradshaw, met with a severe accident while freighting in Montana, north from Butte. His wagon wheels passed over his arm, breaking it badly. He was brought to this city for treatment and is progressing favorably under the care of Dr. Benedict. He is stopping at the house of Mr. F. Holmes.

Willmore.—Brothers John Cooper and C. P. Borgard, from Willmore, were in town to-day. Diphtheria, which was recently prevalent in that place, has disappeared. The people are somewhat disappointed at being left out in the cold by the railroad which does not come nearer the town than 25 miles. General business is dull but crops are promising. The water question, which has perplexed the little community for some time is still unsettled.

Robbery.—Last night a couple of men in town went on a beer tasting expedition. They placed themselves on the outside of too much of the insulating liquid, causing them to assume a prostrate position. While in that unseemly attitude some unaccommodating individuals explored their pockets. From one they abstracted \$100 and from the other \$50 and a watch; at least such is the statement of the relieved parties. The police have been hunting the robbers, but at last accounts had been unsuccessful in discovering them.

The two mulcted men are to-day somewhat sadder, decidedly poorer, and it is to be hoped, a trifle wiser and better than they were yesterday.

A Visit to the West.—This afternoon we had the pleasure of a visit from O. H. Gates, Esq., of Aurora, Ill. He was accompanied to our office by President Joseph F. Smith, to whom he had a letter of introduction from Mr. James R. B. Vanderveer. Brother Smith made the acquaintance of the latter gentleman, on the occasion of the visit of himself and the late Apostle Orson Pratt to the house of Mr. David Whitmer, at Richmond, Mo., a 1877. Mr. Vanderveer is an intimate friend of Mr. Whitmer's, to whom probably he will soon be related by marriage as a maternal uncle. Whitmer's grand-daughter is expected to be consummated.

Mr. Gates is now on his way to California. He has been visiting the several points of interest, and expresses himself as highly pleased with the appearance of our growing city.

DESPERATE FIGHT IN ARIZONA.

THE SETTLEMENT OF ST. JOHN'S RAISED BY COWBOYS—TWO MEN REPORTED KILLED.

The following dispatch from Tucson, A. T., was received this morning:

"The Star of St. John's advised me that a party of nine 'Mormon' cowboys entered the town of St. John's and commenced shooting right and left, which brought on a general engagement. One getting wounded early in the fight fled, followed by three others. Nat Green, the leader, and four others retired to an adobe house and kept up the fight, resulting in the killing of Jas. Vaughn, a 'Mormon,' and Nathan C. Tennie, a prominent 'Mormon' and at one time a Bishop in 'Dixie.' Green was wounded in the left hand. A surrender was forced. Nat and Harris Green surrendered. They are now in jail, awaiting examination. The excitement has abated and no further trouble is apprehended."

There is evidently a mistake in the dispatch, as there is no such class as "Mormon" cowboys. It was probably intended to be said that nine cowboys entered the "Mormon" settlement of St. John's and commenced shooting. One of the brethren, N. C. Tennie, reported killed is well known in this part of the Territory. We learn from President Woodruff that he had, for some time, charge of a steamer and mail in the vicinity of St. John's. St. John's is situated in Apache County, Arizona, and is a comparatively new settlement.

Robbers Captured.—Some time since we published an account of Sheriff Spillbury, of Kane County, accompanied by members of his family, being stopped on the highway and robbed by road agents. The Silver River Mine gives an account of the capture of the robbers. It appears that Mr. Spillbury, soon after the affair occurred, accompanied by officers Hogg and Grant and Mr. A. J. McDonald, went in pursuit. After leaving the River, he traced the brigades to a cabin near the point between there and Leadville. Though search was made, but to no purpose, while, as has since been ascertained, the robbers were under the roof, lying on their backs, and ready to perforate the first man that showed himself. The Sheriff, the other day, received a telegram from Sheriff Clark, at Richfield, stating that he could arrest John Brantley, formerly of Washington, and well known to be one of the two men wanted. He was requested to do so, and Mr. Spillbury at once set out for his game, which he got safe and sound at Richfield and took to Tooeville. Brantley made a full confession of his crime and gave the name of his accomplice as John Todd. It seems that the pair had started in for extensive operations, but were alighted in the bud at the outset.

Giant Powder Tragedy.—Butte had a giant powder tragedy on the morning of the 4th, by a careless use of that explosive. Fred Iselo, proprietor of a mine, which he had with him, and John C. Streicher were killed and W. Schmidt severely injured. The story of the latter is given as follows, in the Miner:

"Fred Iselo, John C. Streicher and another man whose name I do not know and myself, were in one of the cabins just south-west of the Iselo mine the night of the third of July, that is last Monday night. We had been up all night, celebrating the Fourth. Towards morning the other man and I went to sleep on the bed. I was sitting on the edge of the bed, with my head and shoulders leaning back towards the wall. About 4 o'clock yesterday morning Iselo woke me up and said: 'I want to go for you fellows to sleep that way, why you've been asleep nearly three hours, get up. We are going to start a carload of giant powder and set them off all at once.' I roused up then and sat on the edge of the bed. He and Streicher were at the table and I could not see exactly what they were doing, for in one minute afterwards the explosion occurred and I became unconscious. I know nothing more until I was dug out. I did not even hear the noise of the explosion, but I knew of course that the giant powder must have exploded."

The Lists of Immigrants.—At the approach of each company of immigrants to Utah many people are naturally anxious to scan the list of names, in search of those of relatives and friends. In seasons previous to this we have invariably been enabled to publish the lists several days ahead of the arrival of the companies. This season this has been impossible, owing to the speedy transit of the emigration from Liverpool to Ogden. The S. B. Nevada has carried all of the companies this year. That vessel has been fitted up with new engines, and skims over the ocean so rapidly as to reach New York ahead of the mail, by which the lists are sent the day after the departure, and the Nevada leaving on Wednesday, and the Inman mail steamer on Thursday. Besides the speed of the ocean trip, the transit on land is also much more rapid than formerly. We give this explanation to exhibit the reason for the comparative lateness of the publication of the lists.

Prepare for Them.—A large company of Saints are expected here in a day or two, and many of them are Scandinavians. While the kind from that part of Europe be kind enough to render them the assistance they can on arrival. The lists, 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16th Wards will also be on hand with provisions at the Thirtieth Ward, and teams at the Depot. Notice will be given in the News when they will reach here, as soon as the information comes from the company.

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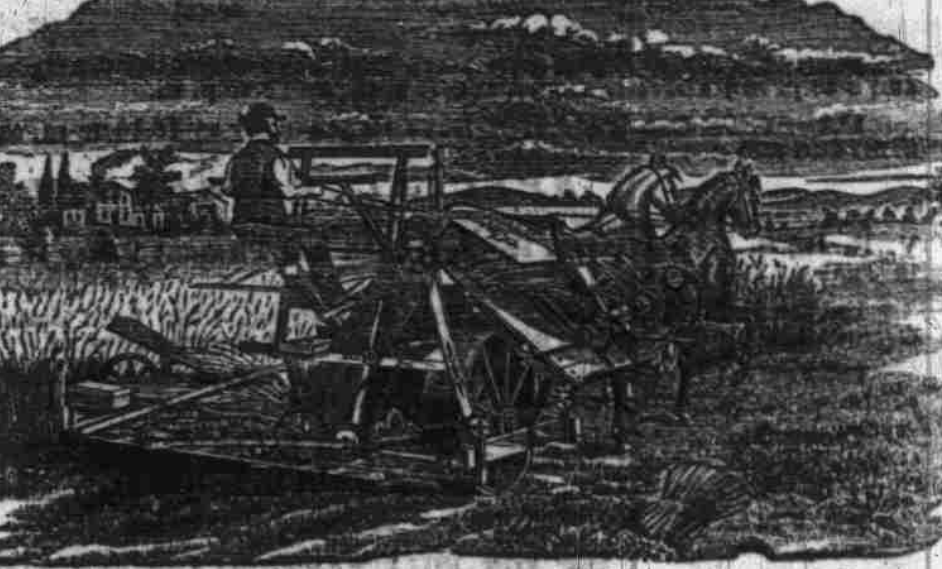
